

## Pediatrics 2 Directions for Creating Your Pediatrics 2 Experience

In order to provide Pediatrics 2 students with the most options possible we have developed a somewhat complex system to aid students in developing the best possible Pediatrics 2 experience. These directions will aid you in filling out the Pediatrics 2 Electronic Site Selection form. A few weeks after you have submitted the form, you will receive your site placement. Many will not get their top choices, but the Pediatrics 2 team will try to honor your wishes. If you have problems with your placement, contact Trevor Monteith, [monteith@ohsu.edu](mailto:monteith@ohsu.edu), 503-494-3195 to explore options.

Each student will have the opportunity to choose from a variety of specialty and general pediatrics sites and rotations. Some specialties are only offered for two week blocks, in these cases, students will also need to rank another specialty or general pediatrics experience from the list of possibilities for the other two weeks of the rotation. Not all general pediatrics or specialty experiences are available for two week blocks, that is why only a few are listed as options.

### **Develop your own pediatric general pediatrics or subspecialty site.**

All of you are welcome to develop your own Pediatrics 2 site.

Sites must meet all these criteria:

#### **The site must be in the State of Oregon**

#### **The preceptor must have an OHSU Courtesy Faculty Appointment**

At least one preceptor must have a faculty appointment to OHSU. These appointments can be obtained by forwarding a copy of the physicians CV to Trevor Monteith ([monteith@ohsu.edu](mailto:monteith@ohsu.edu)) at least **60 days** before the start of the rotation. Check with your preceptor, they may already have an appointment.

## General Pediatrics Options

### Description

Many of these sites may not be available to students. Since sites volunteer to take students, it is often difficult or impossible to determine which are available until after students return their preference forms.

### OHSU Clinics

#### **1. Doernbecher OPC-OHSU Main Campus**

This rotation is in the extremely busy General Pediatrics Clinic at OHSU. Attendings and senior residents share medical student teaching responsibilities. There will also be interns and residents participating in their continuity clinics on site. The student is graded by Dr. Carrie Phillipi who polls all interns, residents and attendings for feedback. This rotation requires one week of mornings in the MBU, OHSU's Newborn Nursery. There are also specialty experiences, one day with ENT, two days in the Child Development and Rehabilitation Center. Students report a high degree of autonomy as residents and attending are very familiar with medical student education at this level. Attendance at morning report is expected.

#### **2. Doernbecher Westside-Beaverton**

**15220 NW Laidlaw Road, Portland, Oregon 97229**

This is a busy pediatric clinic in a suburban neighborhood just past Beaverton on highway 26. Public transit and biking may not be convenient to this location. The clinic is staffed by four pediatricians. Dr. Jeff Miller is the primary preceptor/grader. All of the physicians speak Spanish and some patient interactions are completed entirely in Spanish, though student fluency is not a requirement. There are pediatric residents who staff their continuity clinic at this site. There is also a Healthy Lifestyles Clinic designed to address childhood obesity working out of this clinic, with Dr. Beau Weill. Dr. Miller also runs a pediatric Lipid Disorders Clinic once a month. Students report about half the clinic time was devoted to well child care. The opportunity for shadowing physicians in specialty clinics (e.g., otolaryngology, cardiology, neurology, gastroenterology, dermatology, audiology) on site is available.

## Community Clinics

These are all the general pediatric community clinics that have agreed to serve as teaching sites for Pediatrics 2 students. All are general pediatrics outpatient clinics. In each, there is a physician who has agreed to serve as a primary preceptor. Many of these placements involve more than one provider, some involve travel between different sites.

### **3. Peace Health-Eugene Metropolitan Area**

The Peace Health site in Eugene is one of our most highly rated general pediatrics experiences. Join experienced physicians in a variety of busy clinics serving the Eugene population. The precepting physician is Dr. Thomas Roe, a leader in the American Academy of Pediatrics. He and his colleagues began hosting students since 2005 and are eager to teach. There are a variety of daytime and evening clinic opportunities for learning and students report a high degree of autonomy. Housing in Eugene has been arranged. There is a free bus pass provided and Eugene is a renowned bike city. Unfortunately, some Peace Health facilities are not conveniently accessible by bike or public transit.

### **4. Willamette Falls Medical Group-Oregon City**

This is a well-liked, busy community pediatric clinic in Oregon City, formerly an OHSU satellite facility. The lead preceptor/grader is Dr. Christina Grucella. The physicians are comfortable with students and residents. Students will also work with two other attending over the course of their rotation.

### **5. The Children's Clinic-Tualatin**

Medical students working at The Children's Clinic will be involved in primary care community pediatrics. The clinic's patients come from mostly the nearby surrounding areas extending from SW Portland to Wilsonville. Students will see a mix of both the commercially insured and Care Oregon patients from birth to 18 years of age. Students will have the opportunity to work mostly with a single physician during their rotation, but will also work with several other pediatricians in the office on a regular basis. The Clinic's physicians and staff will strive to help the student become increasingly independent and autonomous in their encounters with patients, though students should expect a significant degree of observational learning.

### **6. The Children's Clinic-Peterkort, Portland-Lisa Reynolds, M.D.**

**Other Clinics:**

What follows are smaller pediatric operations with close working contact with a single provider. Student may still work with other providers and in other offices at the discretion of the preceptor.

**7. Broadway Medical-James Coughlin, M.D.**

4212 NE Broadway, Portland, OR 97202

This is a well-established community pediatric clinic in NE Portland serving a varied population. The student will work with a primary preceptor, James Coughlin, M.D., who will also serve as the grader. Students also spend some time with other physicians in the practice when Dr. Coughlin is unavailable. As in many of the community sites, students report autonomy with the primary preceptor, but have described more of an observer role with the other members of the team. For this practice, students report about 80% of their time was spent with relative autonomy, seeing patients on their own, reporting findings, and developing plans.

**8. Oregon Pediatrics-Frank DiGregorio, M.D.**

5050 NE Hoyt, Portland, OR 97213

This is a busy Portland pediatric clinic. The student will work primarily with Dr. Frank DiGregorio, who serves as the primary preceptor/grader. Dr. DiGregorio has been teaching for over a decade with students nearly every rotation. He is committed to medical student education. Students report a high level of autonomy on this rotation. Patients and families are accustomed to medical students. Up to one day a week will be spent with other physicians in the practice when Dr. DiGregorio is unavailable. Students report less autonomy with the other preceptors.

**9. East Portland Pediatric Clinic-Steven Davis, M.D.**

This is a community practice with more than one provider. You will have a primary preceptor/grader, Dr. Steven Davis, but will work with some of the other members of the staff from time to time. Students report the primary preceptor offers relative autonomy but some staff will have student work in more of an observational role.

This is a busy private community pediatric practice. Students will work primary preceptor/grader Mary Ulmer, M.D. Dr. Ulmer has precepted many tens of students who report she is a terrific teacher. They will also spend some time with various other physicians in the practice as needed. Students report this clinic has a surprisingly diverse population, students say many Hispanic and south Asian patients. As in many of the community practices, autonomy can be variable at this site. Students should be prepared to spend some time in an observer role depending on the physician they are working with.

The student will work with a primary preceptor, George Bengtson, M.D., who will also serve as the grader. Students may spend some time with other physicians in the practice when Dr. Bengtson is unavailable. Students' degree of autonomy is commensurate with their experience and performance.

## Pediatrics 2 Selective Options

The selective experience may consist of some combination of outpatient clinic, inpatient consult or service, operating room time, or time with various inpatient services (i.e., pain and sedation). You may also choose to do a split rotation, two weeks in one specialty paired with another two weeks in a second specialty or general pediatrics experience.

### Subspecialty Selective Options-Four Week Rotations

#### **20. Developmental Pediatrics**

The student will spend time in the evaluation and follow-up clinics of the Child Development and Rehabilitation Center. The focus is on child development and the spectrum of neurodevelopmental disabilities—mental retardation, learning disabilities, autism, cerebral palsy, spina bifida, and others. Interdisciplinary team evaluation and management planning are emphasized. **This rotation is essentially the same as Pediatrics Elective 709 K Developmental Behavioral Pediatrics.**

**Availability: RARE.** Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations per year when no elective student is registered.

#### **21. Developmental Pediatrics-Eugene**

The student will spend time in the evaluation and follow-up clinics of the Child Development and Rehabilitation Center. The focus is on child development and the spectrum of neurodevelopmental disabilities—mental retardation, learning disabilities, autism, cerebral palsy, spina bifida, and others. Interdisciplinary team evaluation and management planning are emphasized.

**Availability: OFTEN.** This is a site that is ready and willing to take students. Since it is an out of town rotation student interest has been low.

**Housing: Provided** Housing is provided through Peace Health. It is an apartment shared with OHSU medical students in Eugene for Pediatrics and other clerkship rotations.

**22. Pediatric Dermatology- This is offered as either a 2 or 4 week rotation**

This specialty has two primary attending, Dr. Krol and Dr. Siegel. Students will divide their time between Doernbecher Children's Hospital and the Center for Health and Healing. There are dermatology residents on this rotation. Students report a wonderful experience. Exposure to dermatology is seen as especially valuable to future pediatricians, family practice physicians, and internists. There are opportunities to go to care management rounds on Wednesday mornings and dermatology lectures. Please speak with your resident or attending about these additional learning opportunities.

Availability: RARE. Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations per year when no elective student is registered.

**23. Pediatric Hematology/Oncology**

The student will spend time in the outpatient Hematology and Oncology Clinics at Doernbecher Children's Hospital. The rotation will focus on the care of pediatric hematology and oncology patients. There will be the opportunity for many procedures (lumbar punctures and bone marrow biopsies). The student will attend educational conferences in the pediatric hematology/oncology division. Each student is required to give a 20 minute oral presentation at the end of the rotation. While primarily an outpatient rotation, there is the opportunity to get some experience with inpatient hematology/oncology as well.

Previous students on this rotation report a lot of autonomy and great teachers. The nature of this clinical environment gives students the opportunity to see the same patients again and again; this continuity of care is a positive learning tool.

**This rotation is essentially the same as the pediatric elective 709 J Pediatric Hematology Oncology.**

**24. Pediatric Genetics/Metabolism**

The student will spend time primarily in the metabolism clinic. Students may also explore other related pediatric subspecialties like genetics. Please talk with Dr. Hanna about these options. The student may participate in inpatient consultation should the need for this arise during the rotation.

**This rotation is essentially the same as the pediatric elective 709 H Pediatric Endocrinology.**

Availability: SOMETIMES This site is willing to take student when there is not a third year student or elective student scheduled.

**25. Pediatric Neurology This is offered as either a 2 or 4 week rotation**

During this month, the student will become facile at the pediatric neurological examination and will be comfortable with basic concepts including anatomic localization of neurological deficits and normal developmental milestones. The student will see a variety of neurological problems, including epilepsy, headache, movement disorders such as cerebral palsy/spasticity and tic disorder, neuromuscular disorders, neurometabolic and genetic diseases. The student will spend time in the child neurology clinics at Doernbecher Children's Hospital and Shriner's Outpatient Center, as well as with the inpatient consult service at Doernbecher. Additional time may be spent on observation of occupational and physical therapy, interpretation of EEG and neuro-imaging studies, and involvement with patients in the surgical epilepsy program who have been admitted for long-term EEG monitoring. Time will also be allowed for discussion and preparation of a project.

This rotation is essentially the same as the pediatric elective 709 L Pediatric Neurology.

**26. Pediatric Pulmonary This is offered as either a 2 or 4 week rotation**

Students will be exposed to children with various lung diseases including cystic fibrosis, asthma, pneumonia, chronic cough, and aspiration. Students will attend 2 CF Clinics and 1 Pulmonary Clinic per week. They will round with the team on inpatients 3-4 days per week. They will attend various clinical conferences. There will be assigned reading materials and videotapes. Early in the rotation the student will choose a project and will present it to the pulmonary faculty at a division meeting. Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations a year when no elective student is registered.

This rotation is essentially the same as the pediatric elective 709 G Pediatric Pulmonology.

**Availability: RARE.** Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations per year when no elective or third year students are assigned to the service.

**27. Pediatric Cardiology This is offered as either a 2 or 4 week rotation**

Students participate in congenital heart clinics, cardiac consultations, journal club, and patient care. Reading ECGs, observing echocardiograms, and cardiac catheterizations are also part of this experience.

This rotation is essentially the same as the pediatric elective 709 F Pediatric Cardiology.

**Availability: RARE.** Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations per year when no elective or third year students are assigned to the service.

### **28. Pediatric Pain/Sedation**

This specialty is divided between two days in sedation, two days with the pain management service, and one day in the operating room. Students have given positive feedback about this rotation, especially working with the pain management team. The lead preceptor/grader is Dr. Jeffrey Koh. Students have really enjoyed the exposure to procedures including intubation, venopuncture and line placement.

**Availability: RARE.** Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations per year when no elective students are assigned to this service.

### **29. Pediatric Emergency Medicine**

In this rotation, students will work 12 9-hour shifts during the month at the OHSU Pediatric Emergency Department. The majority of shifts will be with Drs. David Spiro and Garth Meckler; however certain hours and shifts will be covered by the other EM faculty. Students will be mentored by both residents and faculty. Students will be expected to perform the initial history and physical on their patients, as well as perform all pertinent procedures. Students will also attend didactic conferences, do required reading, and undergo an oral exam at the end of the rotation.

**Availability: RARE.** Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations per year when no elective student is registered.

### **30. Pediatric Otolaryngology (ENT)**

The medical student will spend their rotation with our pediatric otolaryngology, head and neck surgeons, Drs. Milczuk, MacArthur and Richardson. Time is divided between the clinic and the operating room. Typically, about half of the week is spent in the DCH outpatient Otolaryngology clinic and half of the week in the DCH operating rooms with our surgeons. Both experiences afford the student to hone their exam skills of the pediatric ear, nose, pharynx, larynx and neck. Procedures in the clinic that they will observe include: ear exam with otomicroscopy, flexible laryngoscopy, flexible nasopharyngoscopy/evaluation of velopharyngeal insufficiency. These exams are then reinforced by the ability to observe anatomy in the operating room during such procedures as: insertion of tympanostomy tubes with the microscope, nasal and sinus exams, neck exam, pharyngeal exam during tonsillectomy and adenoidectomy, and laryngeal/tracheal/bronchial exams during direct laryngoscopy and bronchoscopy.

### **31. Pediatric General Surgery**

Dr. Mark Silen heads up this pediatric specialty option. This rotation is reported by students as a great experience for students interested in this specialty. Students scrub in on procedures from port placements to hernia repairs. This is a surgical rotation: rounds begin early.

### **32. Pediatric Neurosurgery**

This rotation is led by Dr. Nathan Selden. This is a surgical rotation and highly motivated students, especially those interested in procedures, have thrived in the experience. It is a very specialized area and some students report participating less readily in the development of patient care plans due to the highly technical and complex nature of the specialty. Therefore, this clerkship can be more observational in nature than some of the other Pediatrics 2 options. This rotation offers a lot of time in the operating room with just one clinic day per week.

### **33. Pediatric Urology**

The student is expected to participate in the Pediatric Urology clinics, surgery, and inpatient care. Attendance at Grand rounds and Saturday conference is expected. Patients with common pediatric conditions as UTI's, enuresis, vesicoureteral reflux, hydronephrosis and genital anomalies will be seen and presented to the staff attending.

The student is expected to make a PowerPoint presentation on a subject of interest seen on the clinical rotation at Urology Grand Rounds on the last Monday of their rotation.

### **34. Shriner's Orthopedics**

This is a busy orthopedic specialty located at Shriner's Hospital on Marquam Hill. Students should be prepared for a rigorous experience with time in the operating room and in various clinics. The lead preceptor/grader is Dr. Michael Aiona. This rotation is largely self-directed and very flexible; students report they assist a great deal in the OR. Shriner's staff are open to having students in clinics and the OR. Students are encouraged to obtain a copy of the clinic and surgery schedule and tailor their experience. Keep in mind most of these clinics are follow up in nature. The highly specialized nature of this rotation may mean some time spent observing. Students have a chance to see both common orthopedic issues and more unusual conditions.

### **35. Kaiser Permanente Orthopedics**

This is a specialty experience working with Kaiser's pediatric orthopedics department. Ron Turker, M.D. is the lead preceptor/grader. The student will also work with Stephen Renwick, M.D. There are opportunities for students to work in the OR, fracture clinic, and the outpatient clinic. Students will learn the basics of fracture management, splinting and casting. This rotation would be appropriate for a general education or a student considering orthopedics as a career. We hear Dr. Turker and Dr. Renwick are excellent teachers.

### **36. Allergy Associate Research Center**

Dr. Michael Noonan is the grader and lead preceptor for this rotation. Students feel he has a strong commitment to teaching. There is quite a bit of autonomy; the student will need to be self motivated and willing to help define the experience with the preceptor. Students should know some of the patients are adults. The unique opportunity to combine patient care and clinical research exists for the interested student. Students are also exposed to procedures carried out in the office.

### **38. Outside/In Clinic/General Pediatrics Doernbecher/Mother Baby Unit-Doernbecher**

#### Outside/In

This is a split rotation, requiring a flexible student. Monday and Wednesday mornings the student will work at the Outside/In Clinic. This clinic provides health care services for poor and homeless youth and young adults. The space is shared with a naturopathic clinic, needle exchange program, and many other services for the target population. The cut-off age for clinic access is 30. While many patients are adolescents, students will be required to work with many people in their thirties. Students report many of the patients are there for reproductive health, STI screening, and mental health issues. Residents, both internal medicine and pediatric, a nurse practitioner, and an OHSU adolescent health pediatrician make up the Outside/In team. Please keep in mind you will be working with a resident much of the time. Past students have noted residents on the rotation are also learners so sharing access to patients can be a negotiation. Students will likely work with residents when charting. Dr. Wayne Sells, OHSU faculty and Medical Director of the Outside/In Clinic, will provide a grade for the student. Additional teaching is provided by Jenny Gilhooly, PNP.

#### Doernbecher General Pediatrics Clinic

Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays as well as Monday and Wednesday afternoons the student will be working in the General Pediatrics Clinic at OHSU. Attendings and Senior residents share medical student teaching responsibilities in this clinic. There will also be interns and some residents participating in their continuity clinics on site. There are opportunities to work in pediatric specialty clinics, one day with ENT, two days in Child Development and Rehabilitation, and an afternoon in Nephrology. The student is graded by Dr. Carrie Phillipi who polls all interns, residents and attendings for feedback. She will combine her evaluation with Dr. Sells' evaluation to come up with a final grade for the student. Students report challenges when shifting gears from the adolescent and young adult population at Outside/In to the more typical pediatric populations at the Doernbecher Clinic. Students on this rotation should be comfortable with these transitions. Students report a high degree of autonomy as residents and attending are very familiar with medical student education at this level.

## Pediatrics 2 2 week Rotation Options

The selective experience may consist of some combination of outpatient clinic, inpatient consult or service, operating room time, or time with various inpatient services (i.e., pain and sedation). You may also choose to do a split rotation, two weeks in one specialty paired with another two weeks in a second specialty or general pediatrics experience.

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### **Subspecialty Selective Options-Two Week Rotations**

#### **40. Doernbecher OPC-OHSU Main Campus Doernbecher Mother Baby Unit (Nursery)**

Students will spend one full week in the Doernbecher Children's Hospital Mother Baby Unit, the nursery. There will also be one week spend in the extremely busy General Pediatrics Clinic at OHSU. Attendings and senior residents share medical student teaching responsibilities. There will also be interns and residents participating in their continuity clinics on site.. There are also specialty experiences, one day with ENT, and time in the Child Development and Rehabilitation Center. Students report a high degree of autonomy as residents and attending are very familiar with medical student education at this level. Attendance at morning report is expected.

The student is graded by Dr. Carrie Phillipi who polls all interns, residents and attendings for feedback

#### **41. Pediatric Dermatology- This is offered as either a 2 or 4 week rotation**

This specialty has two primary attending, Dr. Krol and Dr. Siegel. Students will divide their time between Doernbecher Children's Hospital and the Center for Health and Healing. There are dermatology residents on this rotation. Students report a wonderful experience. Exposure to dermatology is seen as especially valuable to future pediatricians, family practice physicians, and internists. There are opportunities to go to care management rounds on Wednesday mornings and dermatology lectures. Please speak with your resident or attending about these additional learning opportunities.

Availability: RARE. Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations per year when no elective student is registered.

**42. Pediatric Neurology This is offered as either a 2 or 4 week rotation**

During this month, the student will become facile at the pediatric neurological examination and will be comfortable with basic concepts including anatomic localization of neurological deficits and normal developmental milestones. The student will see a variety of neurological problems, including epilepsy, headache, movement disorders such as cerebral palsy/spasticity and tic disorder, neuromuscular disorders, neurometabolic and genetic diseases. The student will spend time in the child neurology clinics at Doernbecher Children's Hospital and Shriner's Outpatient Center, as well as with the inpatient consult service at Doernbecher. Additional time may be spent on observation of occupational and physical therapy, interpretation of EEG and neuro-imaging studies, and involvement with patients in the surgical epilepsy program who have been admitted for long-term EEG monitoring. Time will also be allowed for discussion and preparation of a project.

This rotation is essentially the same as the pediatric elective 709 L Pediatric Neurology.

**43. Pediatric Pulmonary This is offered as either a 2 or 4 week rotation**

Students will be exposed to children with various lung diseases including cystic fibrosis, asthma, pneumonia, chronic cough, and aspiration. Students will attend 2 CF Clinics and 1 Pulmonary Clinic per week. They will round with the team on inpatients 3-4 days per week. They will attend various clinical conferences. There will be assigned reading materials and videotapes. Early in the rotation the student will choose a project and will present it to the pulmonary faculty at a division meeting. Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations a year when no elective student is registered.

This rotation is essentially the same as the pediatric elective 709 G Pediatric Pulmonology.

**Availability: RARE.** Only available to Pediatrics 2 students 2 or 3 rotations per year when no elective or third year students are assigned to the service.

**44. Pediatric Cardiology This is offered as either a 2 or 4 week rotation**

Students participate in congenital heart clinics, cardiac consultations, journal club, and patient care. Reading ECGs, observing echocardiograms, and cardiac catheterizations are also part of this experience.

This rotation is essentially the same as the pediatric elective 709 F Pediatric Cardiology.
