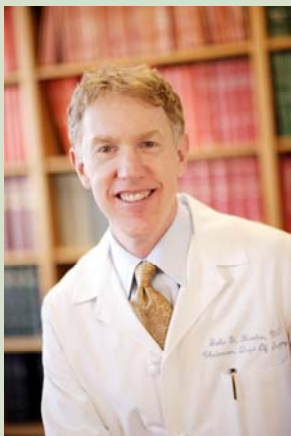

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## Chairman's message

Sometimes four months pass without noticeable change. Sometimes it is hard to remember what the world looked like four months ago. This spring, it is the latter. The most dramatic change to our landscape is the bright silver aerial tram car that makes the trip from the OHSU Hospital to the South Waterfront a shorter journey than walking across the Marquam Hill campus. This filamentous connection has changed our life, bringing OHSU into direct contact with the most rapidly growing portion of Portland. Once you get off the tram and enter the Center for Health and Healing (CHH) the transformed environment is palpable. No longer do we need to make excuses for narrow corridors and small poorly ventilated exam rooms. Included in the CHH is a new fitness center which helps keep the "health" in OHSU. This building is amongst the top ten most environmentally sound office buildings in the nation. As pioneers in this new waterfront development, we are still surrounded by construction, and access by car not as easy as we thought, but all these bugs are being worked out.

Under the direction of **Karen Deveney, MD, Robin Alton, Patricia Southard, RNJD, Karen Kwong, MD, and Melanie Morris, MD**, the education executive committee has much to be proud of. Of its several accomplishments, the most exciting is the reaccreditation of our general surgery residency program for five years and permission to expand its size to 12 residents per year, making the OHSU general surgery residency program the second largest in the nation. Our new cadre of incoming residents is superb. They will "do us proud." The graduating chief residents in general surgery, urology, vascular, cardiac surgery and plastic surgery continue to be heavily recruited for fellowships and jobs. Successes aside, there is still much work to be done. At the request of our President, **Joe Robertson, MD**, I have offered my services to the University at large to help organize simulation and skills training. **Patricia Southard, RNJD** and **Mike Seropian, MD** (Department of Anesthesiology) and I have devoted many hours to bring this vision to

fruition. And if you haven't already heard, an anonymous donor has given 40 million dollars to start a new medical campus on the Schnitzer campus, between the Marquam and Ross Island bridges. A cornerstone of this development will be a multi-disciplinary simulation center bringing together many of the educational efforts of the various schools, departments, and centers at OHSU.

Clinical excellence continues to be our mantra. Not long ago, our hospital-based quality committee put our risk adjusted outcomes on a public website ([ohsuhealth.com](http://ohsuhealth.com)) using the University Health Consortium (UHC) database. This database compares us with other like academic centers across the country. In most areas we performed extraordinarily well, but we were quite surprised to see that the last report places our risk-adjusted mortality as the lowest in the country! It may be impossible to keep this position, but we will aspire to maintain superb clinical quality in high risk and routine care. More importantly, by identifying areas of weakness we have begun to impact quality across the board. This is clearly a concerted effort for the whole University, but special credit for this is due to **Jeff Kirsch, MD** (Chair of Anesthesiology), **Brett Sheppard, MD** and **Karl Welke, MD** from the Department of Surgery and the Quality Executive Committee. In addition to an emphasis on quality, the purchase of a DaVinci robot by OHSU Hospital has allowed **Mitch Sokoloff, MD** and others to bring their considerable skills in robotic minimally-invasive surgery to our university. **Stewart Graham, RN** in the operating room has been a cornerstone to the success of this program.

Research in the Department of Surgery, while not our strongest suit, is sprouting new shoots in the springtime sun. Seed grants, and program support for residents and faculty are becoming more frequent. Our successful programs in shock and coagulopathy (**Marty Schreiber, MD**) and bariatric surgery (**Bruce Wolfe, MD**) have been complemented by a new NCI

## Awards

**John Barry, MD** was elected by the Board of Directors of the American Urological Association (AUA) as President. He will begin his duties as President-Elect of the AUA at the end of May, 2007. At the end of May, 2008, he will begin his one-year term as President of the AUA. The AUA was founded in 1902. It has 15,000 members and, according to the website, it is the world's pre-eminent urological association.

The Graduate Medical Education Committee (GMEC) is charged with the task of overseeing more than 62 residencies and fellowships to ensure that they offer the best education and are carried out in the most professional and collegial manner. To accomplish those goals requires significant effort on the part of both residents and faculty who serve as members of GMEC. Some members of the Committee consistently go beyond expectations to ensure that SOM programs are best served. The Distinguished Service Award recognizes those who have made particular contributions to graduate medical education through the Committee's work. **Kevin Billingsley, MD**, has been selected for the James IV Traveling Fellowship for expertise in surgical oncology. Dr. Billingsley is Chief of the Division of Surgical Oncology, and Hedinger Associate Professor of Surgery. The fellowship is awarded to candidates who have made outstanding contributions to the art and science of surgery and allows the candidate to personally present their newer techniques and innovations to surgical audiences in countries around the world. Each year two to five surgeons are selected to receive this fellowship. Dr. Billingsley traveled to the Queen Mary Hospital at the University of Hong Kong, the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre of the University of Melbourne and Royal Melbourne, Australia, and the Princess Alexandra Hospital of the University of Queensland, Brisbane, Australia. In the fall, Billingsley will travel to liver surgery medical centers in Scotland and France.

**Kristian Enestvedt, MD** was awarded a \$20,000 grant from the Oregon Clinical and Translational Research Institute for his project entitled "Gene therapy in gastrointestinal surgery: Improving anastomotic healing by upregulating angiogenesis." Kristian is a resident in our general surgery residency program.

In collaboration with the Oregon Cancer Institute, **Blair Jobe, MD** was awarded \$150,000 for his grant proposal entitled "Pathogenesis and prevention of esophageal cancer."

**Drs. Blair Jobe and Donn Spight** were awarded \$20,000 in support from the Oregon Clinical and Translational Research Institute for their project entitled "Utilizing Impedance Catheter Technology to Describe Laryngopharyngeal Physiology in Healthy Volunteers."

Congratulations to **Rodney Pommer, MD** and **SuEllen Pommier, PhD** for their two year, \$448,238 NIH award entitled "A Phase I/II Study of DHEA With Letrozole in ER-negative Breast Cancer." This study will treat patients with what has classically been deemed as "hormone-insensitive" breast cancer. These are tumors that lack the classic estrogen and progesterone receptors used for hormone manipulation. However, their research indicates that at least half of ER-negative breast cancers still express an androgen receptor (AR).

## William S. Fletcher Traveling Fellowship Award by Eugene Chang

Last December, I had the opportunity to present the results of a research project at the 20th congress of the International Society of Digestive Surgeons in Rome, Italy. The presentation was the culmination of two years of work on one of the projects in Blair Jobe's research lab. Our study has suggested that dynamic contrast enhanced MRI could play a role in the evaluation of esophageal adenocarcinoma. As one of the finalists in the resident competition, the presentation was part of the first session - 8 am on the first day of the congress, after flying halfway around the world. To my surprise, a large number of people showed up for it, and the congress was accordingly well attended. I bumped into some of the previous OHSU Grand Rounds speakers from the United States. Dr. Hunter also gave his three presentations and introduced me to even more surgeons from around the

world.

Outside the presentations, my wife and I took the opportunity to see Rome while the skies were unseasonably sunny. Although my high school Latin was completely useless when it came to conversational Italian, we managed to find some of the things Rome was known for (the Vatican, gelato, and Italian hot chocolate). Dr. Hunter brought us to one of the local restaurants for a "real" Roman meal hosted by one of his friends from the area, Dr. Roberto Coppola. There, we enjoyed a magnificent (too-many-courses-to-count) dinner with a group of mostly pancreatic surgeons.

The Department of Surgery is pleased to announce a special joint grand rounds presentation on Wednesday, May 2, 2007 at noon in the OHSU Auditorium. Atul Gawande, MD will be the featured speaker. The title of his talk is "BETTER: On the Idea of Performance in Medicine". Gawande received a B.A.S. (1987) from Stanford University, an M.A. (1989) from the University of Oxford, an M.D. (1995) from Harvard Medical School, and an M.P.H. (1999) from Harvard School of Public Health. Since 2003, he has been an assistant professor in the Department of Surgery at Harvard Medical School and a surgeon in the Division of General and Gastrointestinal Surgery at Brigham and Women's Hospital. Since 2004, he has also served as an assistant professor in the Department of Health Policy and Management at Harvard School of Public Health and as assistant director of the Center for Surgery and Public Health at Brigham and Women's Hospital. He is a staff writer for the *New Yorker* and writes the "Notes of a Surgeon" column for the *New England Journal of Medicine*. In 2002, Gawande's book, *Complications* was published. "Complications is a literary version of an informed consent form. It's refreshingly honest, if not always reassuring. Some people still prefer to think of surgeons as infallible gods. But Atul Gawande is a rare and wonderful storyteller who portrays his profession with bravery and humanity." --Ellen Goodman, Pulitzer prize-winning columnist and coauthor of *I Know Just What You Mean*

## SAM LIU MEMORIAL LECTURE



We are very pleased to have Dr. Alden Harken as the seventh annual Liu Lecturer. Dr. Harken is Professor and Chair at UCSF-East Bay Surgery Program. He received his medical degree from Case-Western Reserve Medical School and completed his surgery residency at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston. Harken was associated with the Department of Surgery at the University of Pennsylvania for 18 years. He then traveled to the University of Colorado where he was Professor and Chair of the Department of Surgery for 18 years. In 2003 he was recruited to replace Dr. Claude Organ as UCSF-East Bay's Chair of Surgery.

Dr. Harken was one of two or three cardiac surgeons who created electrophysiologic surgery of the heart understanding the role of the surgeon to interrupt abnormal conduction pathways. More importantly, Harken is a brilliant molecular scientist, and has continuously held NIH grant funding for nearly 40 years.
