Keynote Speaker: Betty Ferrell, RN, PhD, MA, FAAN, FPCN

Dr. Betty Ferrell has been in oncology nursing for 31 years and has focused her clinical expertise and research in pain management, quality of life, and palliative care. Dr. Ferrell is a Research Scientist at the City of Hope National Medical Center and a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing. She has authored five books and over 300 publications in peer-reviewed journals and texts. She is Principal Investigator of a study funded by the National Cancer Institute on "Barriers to Pain and Fatigue Management" and she is also Principal Investigator of the End-of-Life Nursing Education Consortium (ELNEC) project. She directs several other funded projects related to end-of-life care and QOL issues in cancer survivors. Dr. Ferrell is a member of the National Cancer Policy Forum and Chairperson of the National Consensus Project for Quality Palliative Care. She is a hospice volunteer and also the chairperson of the Southern California Cancer Pain Initiative. Dr. Ferrell completed a Masters degree in Theology, Ethics and Culture in spring 2007.



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
