David E. Scharff, M.D.



David E. Scharff, M.D., is director of the International Psychotherapy Institute, and vice-president of the International Association for Couple and Family Psychoanalysis. Scharff is clinical professor of psychiatry at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences and also at Georgetown University. He is a teaching analyst at the Washington Psychoanalytic Institute, a former president of The American Association of Sex Educators, Counselors and Therapists (1988-1989), former director of the Washington School of Psychiatry (1987-1994), and is on the editorial board of several journals.

Scharff received his medical degree from Harvard Medical School. He completed his residency training at Massachusetts Mental Health Center, and his child psychiatry fellowship at the Beth Israel Hospital and Children's Hospital in Washington, D.C. He spent a year in further training in adolescent psychotherapy, object relations theory, and organizational consultation and research at the Tavistock Center in London.

Scharff is board certified in child and adult psychiatry and certified in psychoanalysis. He is a member of the American and International Psychoanalytic Associations.

Dr. Scharff's books include *The Sexual Relationship: An Object Relations Approach to Sex and the Family* (Routledge & Kegan Paul, 1982, reissued by Jason Aronson, 1998) and *Refinding the Object: Reclaiming the Self* (1992). With Jill Savege Scharff, M.D., he co-authored *Object Relations Family Therapy* (Jason Aronson, 1987), *Object Relations Couple Therapy* (1991), *The Primer of Object Relations Therapy* (1992, revised and expanded in 2005), *Object Relations Therapy of Physical and Sexual Trauma* (1994), *Object Relations Individual Therapy* (1998) and *Tuning the Therapeutic Instrument: The Affective Learning of Psychotherapy* (2000). He is the editor with Ellinor Fairbairn Birtles of *From Instinct to Self: The Selected Papers of W.R. D. Fairbairn, Volumes 1 and 2* (Jason Aronson, 1994) and editor of *Object Relations Theory and Therapy: An Introduction* (Jason Aronson, 1995). He is co-editor with Michael Stadter of *Dimensions of Psychotherapy, Dimensions of Experience* (Routledge 2005); co-editor with Jill Scharff of *The Legacy of Fairbairn and Sutherland* (Routledge 2005); co-editor with Henri Parens et al., of *The Future of Prejudice*, and most recently of *New Paradigms for Treating Relationships* (Jason Aronson, 2006.)

Dr. Woodcock joined the OHSU Department of Psychiatry in 1969 and served on the faculty until his retirement in 1990.

During his 21 years as a member of the Division of Child and Adolescent psychiatry, Dr. Woodcock served as chief, Consultation-Liaison Service (1969-1990), director, Outpatient Clinic (1983-1990) and consultant, Children's Psychiatric Day Treatment Center (1982-1999).

The Woodcock Lectureship was established in 1999 to honor Herbert M. Woodcock, M.D., professor emeritus of psychiatry. The Lectureship recognizes Dr. Woodcock's devotion to teaching the principles of psychoanalytic psychotherapy to the broad range of health professionals who are involved in the care and guidance of children, adolescents and young adults.
