Pediatric Residency Program Being Reinstated

After a 10-year hiatus, the OHSU School of Dentistry's pediatric residency program is being reinstated, thanks to a generous gift from the estate of Camilla Rietman, a Coquille, Ore., philanthropist and long-time supporter of the School. The program will officially reopen when the first class enters in 2005.

"Both the School and OHSU are enthusiastic about bringing back this critical program," said Dean Jack Clinton, D.M.D. "The reinvigorated program will play a key role in addressing the shortage of pediatric dentists that is facing both Oregon and the rest of the country."


There has never been a more critical need for pediatric dental services – and future pediatric dentists – in Oregon. With a high statewide unemployment rate and with less than 50 percent of Oregonians having access to fluoridated water, there are many underserved children who are not getting the dental services they need.

Weston Heringer, Jr., D.M.D., '71 was appointed by Dean Clinton to serve as director of the program, including the accreditation process. Heringer received his board certification in pediatric dentistry from the American Board of Pediatric Dentistry in 1990. He currently serves as vice president of the Oregon Dental Association and is chairman of ODA's Give Kids a Smile Day annual event.

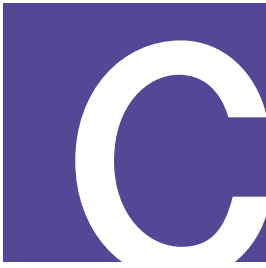
"Dr. Heringer brings the enthusiasm of the dental community, the energy to maintain the momentum

generated by our faculty, and the ability to coordinate with other key people essential to gaining acceptance of the new program within the university. He possesses all the traits necessary to lead us through the accreditation process," said Dean Clinton.

The Reitman gift will allow the School to remodel and equip a pediatric dentistry clinic – to be built in the former dental hygiene clinic – with a plan to purchase equipment that can be transferred to the new dental school when it is built. The pediatric clinic in the new facility will be named in honor of the Rietmans.

Mrs. Rietman's late husband, Carl, was a prominent Coquille dentist. Throughout her life, Mrs. Rietman gave generously to many institutions, including the OHSU School of Dentistry, with a particular emphasis on scholarships and other educational programs throughout Oregon and in Coquille. In addition to funding the pediatric dentistry residency program, Dr. and Mrs. Reitman endowed two scholarship funds – one for general dental students and one for pediatric dentistry residents.

Today we celebrate a milestone for all of these young men and women who are fulfilling their dream of becoming a dentist. This educational journey began in August 2000, some 46 months ago.

Although the excitement of embarking upon a long and difficult curriculum has faded, the energy level has remained constant in spite of all of the effort needed to learn difficult and complex material. You have seen firsthand that as more material is added, more questions need answers, and these answers lead to greater understanding. Greater understanding eventually leads to better care for patients. This circular

process of exploring, learning, questioning and understanding is the key to maintaining intellectual vitality in our profession. Starting today this stimulation will have to originate from within each of you rather than from assignments, projects, exams and timelines.

It might be interesting to review what has occurred during the four-year transition from being an accepted applicant to a graduating dentist. You have completed 5,000 hours of class time, probably another 5,000 hours of studying and reviewing for exams.

Your class has provided care for more than 4,000 patients during 75,000 patient visits. You performed nearly 8,000 single

tooth restorations, 1,300 quadrants of scaling and root planning procedures, 1,600 fluorides and/or sealants, and more than 2,000 gold crowns, inlays, onlays and foil restorations. You have learned volumes of material and gained the experience needed to achieve competence in your chosen profession.

But a dentist is more than a library of biological facts and principles. A dentist is a person with a great deal of knowledge about the anatomy and the physiology of the human body. Dentists know strategies for improving health and preventing diseases, for correcting destructive processes and managing chronic and acute disease conditions. Dentists are oral health experts!

And there is still more. Because you have acquired so much knowledge and skill in matters relating to improving oral and general health, today society grants you the privilege of being a professional.

Many of the changes that you have undergone are indicators of this transition from being a predoctoral student to a health care professional. Let me ask your family and friends, have you noticed the following changes in “your student”: Has their sense of observation heightened? Do they see details and subtleties more quickly and more thoroughly? Have you noticed that they listen more intently before responding or reacting? Have you noticed that they have a heightened sensitivity to their surroundings and especially to your well being and the status of your health? Have you seen in them a greater ability to explain and teach? Do you feel more confident in following their advice — even though they are your little brother or sister or son or daughter? The success of a health care provider is directly related to the development of these qualities.

Please join me in congratulating the Class of 2004 as they begin a new and exciting journey. 📺

Oregon Dental Association Donates \$250,000 to New OHSU School of Dentistry

The Oregon Dental Association (ODA) has pledged \$250,000 to support construction of a new dental school facility at Oregon Health & Science University. The ODA gift was made shortly after OHSU announced plans to build an enhanced campus for interdisciplinary education on donated land in Portland's South Waterfront district. Though plans have not yet been finalized, the new dental school likely will become the first building constructed on the new campus (to be known as the OHSU Schnitzer Campus).


This major commitment from the professional organization that represents some 2,100 of the state's dentists is a strong endorsement of the OHSU School of Dentistry's value to the region and also is a vote of confidence in the school's future.

"This gift from the leaders of dentistry in Oregon represents the foundation upon which our campaign will be built," said Jack Clinton, D.M.D., dean of the OHSU School of Dentistry. "We are grateful to ODA for this most recent indication that it supports the school and its mission. ODA's endorsement is critical to us."

The school's current facility was built in the late 1950s, and its clinics, research labs and educational programs are outdated and overcrowded. Every year the school attracts many

more qualified applicants than it can accept. A new building will allow more students to be admitted and ultimately will help address the dental workforce shortage.

Pending additional fundraising, the new OHSU School of Dentistry will provide space for up to double the current annual enrollment. Plans for the new space include sophisticated simulation labs, with state-of-the-art equipment to replicate the high-tech environment that students will encounter as practicing professionals. The student clinic will serve patients, including some of Oregon's most underserved populations.

A New Era Begins

Planned new OHSU campus to include School of Dentistry.

This summer Oregon Health & Science University entered a new era as Portland's Schnitzer Investment Corp. formally deeded the institution nearly 20 acres of land in the South Waterfront area along the Willamette River. This landmark gift from the Gerald Schnitzer family will allow OHSU to envision and construct a new state-of-the-art center for health and science education in the years ahead.


Gerald Schnitzer's brother, the late Leonard Schnitzer, was a 1946 graduate of the School of Dentistry.

Initial concepts for this campus include a collaborative and interdisciplinary learning center for nursing, medical, dental and engineering students. Early reports suggest that a new dental school could become the first building constructed on the new campus, which will be known as the OHSU Schnitzer Campus.

OHSU School of Dentistry Dean Jack Clinton, D.M.D., cautions that planning for the new campus is still preliminary and that it will take months to determine how the donat-

ed land, located just south of the Marquam Bridge, will be integrated into the institution's overall plans for the South Waterfront — which already include a new high-rise medical clinic and wellness center to be connected to Marquam Hill by an aerial tram.

"The great thing is that this gift is helping to underscore OHSU's commitment to its educational mission," said Clinton. "It is giving us a rare opportunity to start from scratch and re-vision the way we educate the next generation of dentists."

At the June 29 deed signing ceremony, OHSU President Peter Kohler, M.D., acknowledged the Schnitzer family for its extraordinary commitment to the institution, calling this gift "transformational — an opportunity that comes along once in a generation." Also present at the deed signing was Rick Wilson, DDS, chair, School of Dentistry fund raising council, and Cathryn Majeran, DMD, president of the Alumni Association. 

PROH to prove beneficial

The OHSU School of Dentistry is launching an innovative new program — called PROH: the Practice-based Research in Oral Health network — that will provide new opportunities for clinical trials in oral health care. The result will be research-based information that can be used to develop advanced practices in oral health.

"Much of dentistry tends to be based on empirical evidence — based on clinical experience but not on the type of hard data that is the backbone of clinical trials," said Thomas J. Hilton, D.M.D., M.S., director of the PROH network. "For years, medicine has used practice-based research networks (PBRNs) to conduct clinical research. They have been in existence for several decades and have been successfully employed to investigate a wide variety of relevant medical issues. Until now, however, PBRNs have not been a part of oral health clinical research. The PROH network, however, successfully addresses this deficiency."

The PROH network soon will open its first research study, sponsored by Rowpar Pharmaceuticals, Inc. Rowpar has had an oral rinse on the market to reduce oral malodor. This project will test the rinse's antibacterial effectiveness as an adjunctive periodontal treatment. Under the direction of Theresa Madden, D.D.S., Ph.D., co-director PROH network, four private practices in Bend and Portland will conduct the study that will involve a total of 100 patients.

In addition, plans are being finalized for a PROH conference to be held December 3-4 in Portland. The program will be dedicated to "Research 101," a discussion of clinical research topics for PROH clinicians. This will give participants an opportunity to learn more about conducting clinical research, as well as to provide input about future PROH studies. Dec. 4 will be a continuing education course on anterior esthetic composites, featuring Dr. Marcos Vargas from the University of Iowa. The morning will be a lecture session, followed by a hands-on laboratory in the afternoon. PROH clinicians who attend the free Dec. 3 session will be able to attend the Dec. 4 session at half price.

PROH will establish the infrastructure to perform a variety of oral health research in a diversity of practice settings. About 100 practitioners in Oregon have expressed interest in becoming PROH investigators.

Message from the President

Do we *really* need a new dental school? No one can argue with the fact that our alma mater continues to turn out exceptional clinicians even though faculty and students work out of a building constructed in the 1950s. Are we simply caught up with the excitement of OHSU expanding to the waterfront? Do we really need to plan now for a new school? The short answer is yes. We must acknowledge the glaring deficiencies in the building where we all learned to become practicing professionals.

Here is what faculty, administrators, students and maintenance personnel had to say about our school's physical condition in a recent survey:

If the school hopes to continue to provide a quality education to students, it must attract distinguished faculty. But in the highly competitive world of recruitment, an out-of-date facility is a dealkiller. We have no new offices — or even adequate parking — to offer prospective personnel. Currently faculty must share unimproved, un-air-conditioned space, making it difficult to work comfortably or to consult privately with students. Meanwhile inadequate and insufficient lab space makes it difficult to recruit educators who will be expected to perform research. Few would choose to set up shop in a building with such old plumbing that all water must be filtered or where the HVAC system is a constant struggle.


Then there are the clinics themselves, which were designed for a form of standup dentistry not practiced for decades. Today's methods require much more space, but that space simply doesn't exist in clinics so crowded that supplies have had to be moved into the hallways. Students are forced to supply their own instrumentation and necessities simply because there is no place to store the setups.

The electrical system is grossly deficient. It was designed long before computers and before the demands of current technology. In order to operate the fourth floor lecture hall projector, for instance, all the lights in the room must be turned off. There is no infrastructure for running cables or wireless networking barriers and no space for chair-side computers or state-of-the-art retrieval systems.

Private discussions with patients are also difficult because of space limitations. Small conference, seminar, meeting and study areas are practically nonexistent in the current building.

The sad fact is that many prospective students choose to study elsewhere because the school's physical plant is so shabby. The locker room areas are unchanged since they were built — except they've been expanded into hallways — and there's currently no cafeteria, requiring everyone to leave the premises for a meal.

Yes, we all have managed. We took advantage of what was available, and we learned how to practice dentistry. But let there be no mistake. Just as many of us may have personally lost some of our luster since graduation, the dental school and its infrastructure have done the same. What was new and shiny and cutting edge in our day is now used and dull and obsolete.

There is no question that a new dental school is desperately needed. The only question is whether we can count on you to help in supporting this need. Please respond when we call on you. There is no greater cause.
