Breast Cancer Survivors: Exercise and Raloxifene

Women are randomized to one of four groups (placebo, exercise, exercise plus drug, or drug alone) and followed for 2 years.

Fracture Risk in Premenopausal Breast Cancer Survivors

This is a pilot study to evaluate current and annual changes in the fracture risk profile in four groups of breast cancer survivors 3-15 months post completion of chemotherapy: (1) ovarian function receiving tamoxifen (2) ovarian function not receiving tamoxifen; (3) ovarian failure receiving tamoxifen (4) ovarian failure not receiving tamoxifen; and, in premenopausal cancer-free controls.
