Rotation-Specific Objectives for Resident Education

Rotation: __OHSU Black__ Resident year-in-training: __PGY1__

Rotation Description: This intern level rotation involves the resident on the trauma/spine orthopaedic team at OHSU Hospital. The resident has a fixed weekly schedule that defines his/her responsibilities to two orthopaedic faculty, yet ensures an appropriate surgical and nonsurgical educational experience. The rotation time is spent on managing patients with orthopaedic trauma and with conditions a general orthopaedist would manage. The focus on the rotation is in learning basic principles, evaluation techniques, and treatment techniques in these areas. The resident participates in patient care at OHSU Hospital, but always with the same two faculty members for the entire rotation.

Medical Knowledge:

- Become familiar with basic textbook information and current journal articles on orthopaedic specialties pertinent to this rotation.
- Attend and participate in the orthopaedic resident conferences

Patient Evaluation:

- Understand the importance of and attain basic competence in performing a thorough evaluation of new and return patients in clinic by history, physical examination, and ordering and interpretation of imaging and laboratory studies.

Decisionmaking/Management:

Resident year-in-training: PGY1

Rotation Description: This junior resident level rotation involves the resident on the orthopaedic team at the VAMC. The largest part of this rotation will involve inpatient care of orthopaedic patients, but the resident is also assured an appropriate surgical and nonsurgical educational experience. The rotation time is spent on managing patients with conditions a general orthopaedist would manage. The focus on the rotation is in learning basic principles, evaluation techniques, and treatment techniques in these areas.
