Family Physicians Receive Major Awards at Graduation

It was Family Medicine Day at the OHSU School of Medicine Graduation Ceremony held Monday, June 6 at the Arlene Schnitzer Concert Hall.

A number of major awards went to family physicians: Lisa Dodson received the *Leonard Tow Humanism in Medicine award for faculty*, and Mischa Ronick, graduating senior bound for family medicine training at the University of Wisconsin received the *Humanism in Medicine award for students*. Michael Goodwin, also honored as the *Oregon Academy of Family Physicians Outstanding Senior Student* and the *Mary Lundy Family Medicine Awardee*, was the recipient of the *Edward S. Hayes Gold-Headed Cane Award*, the top award presented to a graduating senior. Michael is headed to the Providence Milwaukee Family Medicine Residency Training Program.

And Anita Taylor received the *Faculty Mentor Award* for "outstanding skill and dedication to advising and mentoring medical students." Also at the ceremony, Jessie Flynn was honored to serve as *Faculty Marshall* and John Saultz led the recitation of the *Oath of Geneva*. All four of these honorees were selected by the Class of 2011 students.

At the 2-½ hour ceremony, 102 graduates entering residency programs received academic hoods and diplomas. Of these, 25—one quarter of the graduating class—are entering postgraduate training in family medicine.

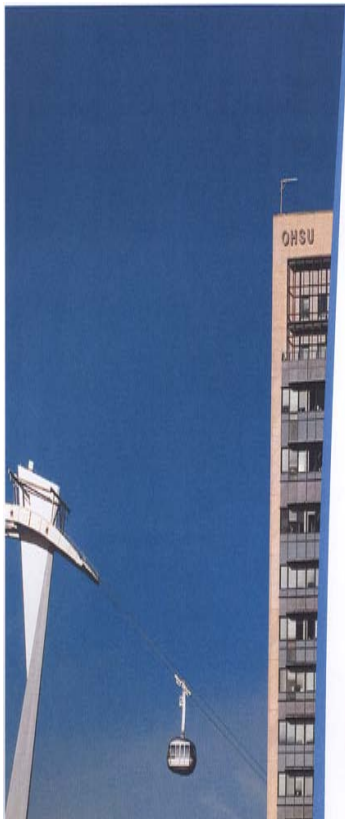

Elaine Waller Training for First Triathlon

A letter from Elaine Waller, Research Assistant in OHSU Family Medicine.

Dear Friends and Family,

I'm taking on a challenge and need your help!

In 2007, my friend Kerrie was diagnosed with stage-three B-cell lymphoma and began a long, difficult journey that tested her in ways that I can only imagine. Fortunately, I am very happy to say that Kerrie is cancer free today and enjoying life with her family, friends, and her brood of backyard chickens!

Before I knew about Kerrie's diagnosis, my experience with cancer was pretty limited. An aunt had died of melanoma in her thirties, decades before I was born, so there had always been a certain paranoia about moles in my family. I've also watched too many friends struggle with the loss of loved ones to cancer. But Kerrie's experience touched me deeply. She just didn't fit my image of a cancer patient. She was young, active, healthy, fun and easy going. Rationally I knew that cancer struck randomly and unexpectedly, but until then I guess I didn't want to believe it.

Since then I've known several more people who have been diagnosed with cancer and who are in various stages of treatment. But it hit closest to home earlier this year when my partner, Jane's, father was diagnosed with stage-four lung cancer. This news could not have been more devastating or shocking. Tom is a non-smoker and the healthiest, most active, 69-year-old I've ever met. He's been a marathon runner much of his life and is an avid cyclist and tennis player. In fact, Jane and her brothers had been planning a long bike ride with their dad this spring before he got sick. Sadly, he's not well enough for that ride now - but I heard that he recently snuck a 5 mile ride on a slow granny bike!

I first heard about The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's (LLS) Team In Training (TNT) four years ago, when Kerrie was made an honored teammate by someone she had never even met! This amazing guy had just started training for his first triathlon and had heard of Kerrie's struggle through a mutual friend. He trained and raced in her honor that year, and in doing so, raised funds for LLS and cancer research that just may have saved her life.

This summer, I'm training with TNT to participate in my first triathlon <http://www.tricalifornia.com/index.cfm/PG2011-main.htm>. Crazy, I know. But it seems a lot less crazy when I think about doing it in honor of Tom and to help raise money to find a cure for these horrible diseases. I hope you will follow my training progress and celebrate with me when I cross the finish line on September 10th!

In Memoriam: Dr. Tom Stern

Thomas Stern, M.D., FAAFP, of Sun Lakes, Ariz., died May 28 at age 90.

Stern received his medical degree from the Oregon Health & Science University School of Medicine, Portland, in 1950, subsequently completing both a rotating internship in 1951 and a resident/general surgery internship in 1952 at St.

Vincent Hospital (now Providence St. Vincent Medical Center) there. Previously, he served for four years in the U.S. Navy Medical Corps and V-12 Navy College Training Program.

After practicing in Sherwood, Oregon, as Merle Pennington's partner, from 1952-60, Stern moved to Manhattan Beach, Calif., where he maintained a solo practice from 1960-74. From 1970 to 1974, Stern directed the Family Practice Residency Training Program at Santa Monica Hospital Medical Center (now Santa Monica-University of California-Los Angeles Medical Center and Orthopaedic Hospital). It was during this time that he was tapped to serve as technical adviser for the *Marcus Welby, M.D.*, TV series.

Stern then moved to Kansas City, Mo., to fill the post of director of the AAFP Division of Education. Until his retirement in 1983, he also served the Academy in various other capacities, including as project director and founder of the Residency Assistance Program (now Residency Program Solutions), vice president of education and scientific affairs, deputy EVP, and founder of the AAFP Home Study Self-Assessment Program. After leaving the Academy, he was named the first vice president of professional and corporate affairs for the Family Health Foundation of America, which subsequently became the AAFP Foundation. The AAFP Foundation's Thomas L. Stern, M.D., Lectureship was established in his honor after his 1991 retirement from the foundation.

During his retirement, Tom maintained his ties to OHSU and the Department of Family Medicine. With his passing, we have lost one of the giants in our specialty.

In Memoriam: Dr. Barbara Starfield

Our 1994 Mack Lipkin Visiting Professor, Dr. Barbara Starfield, died suddenly on Friday, 10 June 2011, apparently due to a coronary event while swimming at her California home. Her passing is an irreplaceable loss for those of us in the global community who care deeply about health care and equity.

A pediatrician by training, health services researcher by trade, and natural teacher by talent, Dr. Starfield was University Distinguished Service Professor at the Johns Hopkins University Bloomberg School of Public Health and School of Medicine, as well as Director of its Primary Care Policy Center. She spent more than 50 years at Johns Hopkins. Barbara was a tireless advocate for family medicine and primary care. She reminded us of why we chose to become family doctors – to help people, improve health, and make the world a better and fairer place.

Using detailed data and compelling analysis, she taught us things about ourselves that we believed, but did not know for certain. She opened the eyes of family doctors to the considerable abilities we have, the weighty responsibilities we carry, and the unrealized possibilities we represent. She saw family doctors as the best hope for health care. Many times, she challenged our vision of what family medicine should look like, and nudged us to see further and clearer. She will be remembered for her passion for social justice, incisive intelligence, and incredible energy.

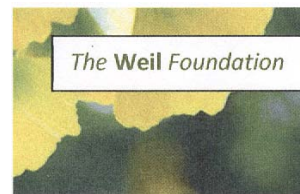

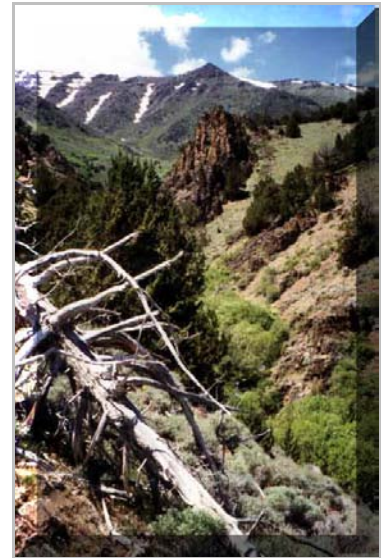
