Tom Becker Honored For Collaboration

Each year, the OHSU Faculty Senate with the OHSU Foundation present the Extinguished Distinguished Faculty Awards in five areas: teaching, leadership, service, collaboration, and research. Dr. Tom Becker was recognized as a nominee from the School of Medicine for the 2010 Collaboration Award. In the arc of Tom’s career, he has always appreciated the power of interdisciplinary research. While at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine, Tom assembled a team of molecular biologists, oncologists, and OB/GYN specialists to conduct research on the risk factors associated with human papilloma virus (HPV) infections and cervical dysplasia. Upon coming to OHSU, his leadership resulted in the establishment of the biostatistics resources that support wide ranging research collaborations throughout OHSU. Perhaps Tom’s strength as a builder of collaborations is best reflected in his vision to create the partnership between the Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board and the OHSU Prevention Research Center. For over 12 years, this partnership of tribal and university scientists has conducted and published on a wide range of prevention topics, including cancer control, injury prevention, substance abuse, and vision and hearing health. Tom’s leadership has brought together a powerful coalition that involves our Department’s faculty, tribal communities, the Devers Eye Institute, the Oregon Hearing Research Center, federal agencies, and the State Department of Human Services. **We congratulate Tom on his nomination and the public recognition of his many collaborative contributions to not only OHSU, but many tribal, state, and national efforts to improve public health!**

Awards:

Phillippe Thuillier, Ph.D., received an award funded by the NW Heart of Gold to support research focused on understanding the role of food and diet in preventing cancer. One of the focuses of Thuillier's lab is to understand the effect of dietary nutrients (Omega 3 fatty acids, broccoli and others) on breast and prostate cancer prevention. Research has determined that broccoli and Omega 3 fatty acids decrease tumor growth and that the mechanisms involve regulation of cell death and oxidative stress (an initial trigger for cancer promotion). A better understanding of the role of dietary fatty acids in cancer development may lead to more efficient prevention strategies. The NW Heart of Gold, which is comprised of Columbia River Yacht Club members, has raised nearly \$800,000 through an annual dinner and auction to support research at the OHSU Knight Cancer Institute since 2003.

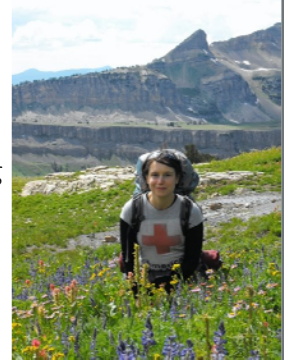

We are also pleased that **Priya Srikanth** has agreed to take on the role of Happy Lab instructor. Priya will hold regular office hours in the PHPM computer lab throughout the year, beginning in the Summer 2010 quarter.

Students who have registered for thesis credits should send a note to happylab@ohsu.edu requesting assistance, and describe the guidance/advice they might need. Once a request is received, Priya will either: answer student questions via email, notify students to attend the standing Happy Lab office hours, or set up individual meetings as her time allows.
