Meet Your 2010-2011 Representatives



1st year rep—Aisling Fernandez

My name is Aisling (“Ashleen”) Fernandez and I’m a native of Hershey, PA. In 10th grade, I shadowed an infectious disease epidemiologist and immediately knew what I wanted to be when I “grew up!” After studying Spanish and microbiology at the University of Maryland, I volunteered at an HIV clinic in Lesotho, returned to the US to complete data analysis at the NIH, got married, moved across the country, and went on a bike tour honeymoon through WA, OR and CA. During a year in Richland, WA I was volunteering in a Food Bank, raising produce for a Community-Supported Agriculture (CSA), enjoying rolling tumbleweeds and desert sunsets, and looking forward to starting grad school here at OHSU.

My interests are infectious disease patterns, the importance of nutrition and exercise for mental and physical health, and child, immigrant and rural health. I am very excited to be the 1st Year Student Rep and hope to develop a sense of community among all MPH students. Also, I want to encourage my peers to study together, to learn professional skills, and to develop eloquent written and verbal communication. We will need to clearly communicate the results of our epidemiological and biostatistical analysis to influence policy and public health.

2nd year rep—Nathan Ansbaugh

Originally from Boulder, Colorado, Nate moved to Portland in 2008 after graduating from the University of Oregon where he earned his bachelors of science in human physiology and chemistry. Since then, he has worked back and forth between Oregon and Colorado as a full time professional ski patrol medic on Mt. Hood and a backpacking and mountaineering guide in Rocky Mountain National Park. At OHSU, Nate is now working with researchers at the Portland VA Hospital on a project exploring Agent Orange, a defoliate used during the Vietnam War, as a potential risk factor for prostate cancer. Additionally, Nate is the teaching assistant for the epidemiology series here in the MPH program, works part time with the acute and communicable disease program at the Oregon public health division, and can often be seen on his bike or running around town as a local triathlete. As the second year student representative, one of his main goals has been implementing a peer advising system consisting of second year students along with faculty advisors from epidemiology and biostatistics that work together with a small group of first and second year students to guide students on a clear and successful path through the program. Additionally, with the help of the other student representatives and students from the first and second year class, Nate is working to bring the first and second year classes together in a team effort to take the MPH program at OHSU into the Oregon community and to become a more active voice in the OHSU community. In the meantime, Nate is applying for medical school and will defend his thesis on December 15th, 2010.
