

Hypospadias

Hypospadias (hy-po-SPAY-dee-us) is a birth anomaly in boys in which the tube that drains urine from the bladder to exit the body, called the urethra, opens on the underside of the penis instead of at the tip. With hypospadias, the opening of the urethra may be located anywhere along the underside of the penis. This can be treated by surgery. When hypospadias is not treated, it can result in problems learning to use the toilet, urine spraying when using the toilet, and a curved penis during erection. More severe forms of hypospadias can interfere with sexual intercourse later in life. In most cases, the exact cause of hypospadias is unknown. Sometimes hypospadias runs in families, but environment also may play a role.
