

Treaty Of 1855

Article Two

munder the direction of the President of the United States, who may from time to time at his discretion, determine what proportion thereof shall be expended for such objects as in his judgment will promote their well-being, and advance them in civilization, for their moral improvement and education, for buildings, opening and fencing farms, breaking, land, purchasing teams, wagons, agricultural implements and seeds, for clothing, provision and tools, for medical purposes...

Treaty of 1855

Article Three

...the United States agree to expend the sum of fifty thousand dollars during the first and second years after its ratification, for the erection of buildings on the reservation, fencing and opening farms, for the purchase of teams, farming implements, clothing, and provisions, for medicines ...

Treaty of 1855

Article Four

...the United States agree to erect, at suitable points on the reservation, one saw-mill, and one flouring- mill, a building suitable for a hospital ... To purchase and keep in repair for the term of twenty years all necessary mill fixtures and mechanical tools, medicines and hospital stores, books and stationery for schools, and furniture for employees. The United States further engage to secure and pay for the services and subsistence, for the term of twenty years, (of) one superintendent of farming operations, one farmer, one blacksmith, one wagon and plough maker, one carpenter and joiner, one physician, and two school-teachers.

 - Headquarters Washington DC
 - ▶ 12 Divisions
 - Portland Area Office
 - ▶ 30 tribes and 150,000 eligible clients
- Indian Health care improvement act
- 4. 1975 Title 638 Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (ISDEAA), Titles I and V (1994)
- 5. Compact

Yellowhawk Tribal Health Center

- ► Compacted 1996
- ▶ Health Commission
- Board of Tribal Directors
- Essentially owned and operated by the tribes
- Serves 3500 patients
 - ▶800 patients over 60







