Assessment Council: State of the Programs (Cycle 3)



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This report is the third State of the Programs report issued by the OHSU Assessment Council (Council) which summarizes the major accomplishments related to assessment of student learning outcomes (SLOs). The first and second reports, along with the council's charge, supporting documents, and evidence for this report are publicly available on the OHSU Assessment & Evaluation website.

The OHSU Assessment Council has been in place since 2006, initially focusing on the development of a shared language and expectations regarding assessment. As its work progressed, the Council developed assessment frameworks and rubrics to review and approve student learning outcomes (SLOs) for academic programs. At the end of Cycle 2 (AY 2013-2014), all academic programs had approved SLOs based on a standardized rubric with those results publicly posted. Additionally, nearly all academic programs had assessment plans scored and approved using a standard process and feedback form, also available off of the OHSU Assessment & Evaluation website.

At the end of Cycle 2, six additional faculty members were recruited to facilitate increased participation in the Council's work and prepare for work slated in Cycle 3. The addition of these faculty members – that included a representative from the OHSU Faculty Senate – provided a well-rounded perspective to the expanded membership.

The focus of Cycle 3 (AY 14-15) was in four main areas:

- 1. Map each academic programs SLOs to the <u>OHSU Core Graduation Competencies</u>. This mapping assisted both the programs and the university to identify gaps and/or unintended overlaps in the overall curriculum.
- 2. Review and provide feedback to programs with submitted assessment findings (SLOs & Assessment Findings). Feedback to Program Directors noted the connection between Part 5 (Standards, Criteria, & Rubrics) and Part 6 (SLOs & Assessment Findings) and made suggestions, when appropriate, for modification especially when reported data appeared loosely connected to stated assessment objectives.
- 3. Analyze and refine the Assessment Plan, Part 7 (State of the Program Report) framework to minimize duplication with Part 6 and, in its modifications, align the Part 7 framework to embed more directly into the Five-year Academic Program Review process conducted by OHSU Faculty Senate. The content of Part 7, though not under the purview of the Assessment Council, was included in this annual reporting process to streamline activities for program directors and faculty to assist them in conducting an annual framework for assessment in preparation for the Five-year Academic Program Review.
- 4. Prepare and/or review documentation (e.g., *Institutional Academic Effectiveness Plan*) and processes for NWCCU accreditation visit as well as discuss sustainability plans for the Council.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM STATUS SUMMARY

The status of programs in their completion of an assessment plan in Cycle 3 remained static when compared to numbers reported in Cycle 2. Currently, 63 programs are on the books or are in development. At the completion of Cycle 2, 90% (n=46) of all academic programs had completed assessment plans (defined as completion through *Part 4 – Student Learning Outcomes Assessments*) or had approved waivers (n=11). Approved waivers include programs affiliated with the School of Public Health since the school is being newly formed and the programs are undergoing changes. Though not impacting the data presented in the paragraph, one program resubmitted its plan

in Cycle 3 after being provided consultation by an educational specialist from the Teaching and Learning Center. Those revisions were approved by the Council. The College of Pharmacy's Part 3 was also accepted in Cycle 3. Two new Part 3 plans were submitted by the Division of Management and will be reviewed once the Council convenes in Cycle 4. One program's plan, Health Sciences Technology Entrepreneurship, remains undeveloped.

In Cycle 3, 50% (n=23) correlated their SLOs to the OHSU Core Graduation Competencies and 54% (n=25) submitted *Parts 5 and 6 -- Standards, Criteria & Rubrics and Assessment Findings*. Appendix A inventories the Cycle 3 progress. The *Part 6* rubric is publicly available from of the *OHSU Assessment & Evaluation* website.

ASSESSMENT COUNCIL LEADERSHIP CHANGE

At the beginning of Cycle 3, Thomas Boudrot, Director of the Teaching and Learning Center, was appointed as the Assessment Council's interim chairperson as the former chairperson, Tanya Ostrogorsky took a position at Oregon State University College of Pharmacy, but remains a member of the Council. This change had some impact on the momentum of the Council's progress in Cycle 3 due to the transfer of leadership and steep learning curve associated with the chairperson's duties.

The interim chairperson of the Council, Thomas Boudrot, has now retired from OHSU. Since the Assessment Council is a sub-unit of the OHSU Academic and Student Affairs Council (ASAC), the chairperson of the ASAC is charged with the responsibility of naming a new chairperson. As of the writing of this report, a chairperson has not yet been appointed.

RECOMMENDED NEXT STEPS

The recommended next steps for the OHSU Assessment Council to be implemented in Cycle 4 are:

- · Identify Assessment Council chairperson.
- Provide consultation to Program Directors with insufficient assessment plans up to and including Part 6.
- Disseminate *Part 7* and establish a timeframe for completion. Since this part is not under the purview of the Assessment Council, no rubric is needed. However, technical assistance in bridging *Part 7* to the *Five-year Academic Program Review* should be provided.
- Establish an ongoing review process of submitted program assessment plans to ensure that SLOs and assessments address identified issues and changing program and learner demands.
- Linked with the items above should be the continued identification of faculty development needs and the necessary supports to promote continuous improvement.
