

To expand the primary care nursing workforce in Oregon by recruiting nursing students and educating nursing students, nurses, and community partners statewide about the role of community-based primary care nurses as essential members and leaders within primary care teams.

## Progress 2018-2020

1

Modify the Oregon Consortium for Nursing Education (OCNE) curriculum to support the education of community-based primary care nurses on all OHSU SON campuses.

Concept Based Learning Activities were offered on 12 different topics. Follow-up seminars resulted in 66 hours of supplemental education on the role of RN's in Primary Care.

Develop and expand academic-practice partnerships and student placements with nine community-based primary care (CBPC) clinics in five counties in urban, rural and frontier Oregon.
