Nutrition Oregon Campaign update

The Eastern Oregon hub received a \$200,000 grant from Share Our Strength to expand the Frontier Veggie Rx program. The program will now include a nutritional education component, and standardize interventions and evaluation methods across Malheur, Harney and Lake Counties. The grant is in conjunction with Eastern Oregon Coordinated Care Organization (EOCCO), Eastern Oregon Healthy Living Alliance (EOHLA), Greater Oregon Behavioral Health Institute (GOBHI), Valley Family Health Care and the OHSU Moore Institute.

- The <u>Alaska Native Health and Wellness Research Center</u>, part of the Moore Institute, received a 5-year \$3 million NIH grant to identify molecular mechanisms linking the protective role of culture to blood pressure regulation, a major risk factor for stroke in Yup'ik Alaska Natives.
