


Buber and Burnout: A Framework for Well-being Mitch Nohner MD, Alan Hunter MD

Case:

A 30 year old medical resident presented to turn of the century philosopher Martin Buber to discuss his personal disillusionment. The resident lamented, "When in the grave night-hour, [I] lie, racked by a waking dream...and noted amid [my] torment: there is still life, if only I got through to it—but how, how?" When pressed for what helps improve these feelings he replies "You see my wretched [self], I confess to you it is empty, and whatever I do in myself," I cannot "fathom" nor fix my emptiness. 1

Buber diagnosed the resident with burnout. one of the "increasing numbers, realizing with increasing distress" that the institutions governmental, economic, corporate, academic that ensconce their work "yield no public life" and instead erode at their vitality.1

"If I face a human being as my Thou and say the primary word I-Thou to him, he is not a thing among things...not a he or she...[but] he is Thou and fills the heavens"1

"In the eyes of him who takes his stand in [I-Thou] and gazes out of it... can be effective, helping, healing, educating, raising up, saving"1

I/it

"The man who says I-It...with the magnifying glass of peering observation he bends over particulars and objectifies them... he knits them into a scheme of observation without any feeling of universality"1

it/it

"If a culture ceases to be centered in the living and continually renewed relational event [i.e the I-Thou], then it hardens into the world of It, which the glowing deeds of solitary spirits only spasmodically break through"1
