#### **National Nutrition Month**

Learn about making informed food choices and developing good eating and physical activity habits to reduce the prevalence of chronic diseases. <u>OHSU's Bob and Charlee Moore Institute for Nutrition and Wellness</u> offers <u>educational tools</u> in multiple languages.

### **Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month**

Raise awareness about the inclusion of people with developmental disabilities in all facets of community life. The OHSU University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities has a 50-year history of improving the lives of people with disabilities throughout Oregon. In 2021, Oregon changed policy by passing Senate Bill 1606, guaranteeing Oregonians with disabilities access to people they trust to provide supports when they are in the hospital - listen to this podcast. #### **#LGBTQHealth Week**

This year's theme is "Live Out Loud for LGBTQ Health!" to encourage everyone to speak openly about LGBTQ Health and ending stigma through accessible, affirming, and inclusive healthcare services. Various education and advocacy events will take place during March 21-25.

### March 1 I Zero Discrimination Day

An observance <u>created by the United Nations</u> to promote equity. Become informed about and promote inclusion, compassion, peace and above all a movement for change.

### March 8 | International Women's Day

A United Nations-sanctioned <u>global holiday</u> that celebrates women's contributions to society, raises awareness about the fight for gender parity.

### March 21 I International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination

The United Nations proclaimed the <u>International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination</u> in 1966. Every year the international community come together in an effort to eliminate all forms of racial discrimination.

### March 31 I Cesar Chavez Remembrance Day

Chavez founded the <u>United Farm Workers of America</u> with Dolores Huerta and brought light to the largest boycott against and is credited for organizing a union to fight social injustices.

### March 31 I International Day Transgender Day of Visibility

Recognizes the resilience, accomplishments and ongoing barriers of the <u>transgender community</u>. Rachel Crandal, a transgender activist, founded this day in 2009. Crandall wanted to highlight the fact that the only transgender-centric day that is internationally recognized is Transgender Day of Remembrance, which is in mourning of members of the community who had lost their lives, and that there was no pay homage to living transgender people. Local Portland LGBTQ Organizations <u>Basic Rights of Oregon</u> and <u>Pride Northwest</u> offer local events.

### **Women's History Month**



We pay tribute to the ceaseless work of caregivers and frontline workers during the pandemic and a recognition of the thousands of ways that women of all cultures have provided healing and hope throughout history.

OHSU's Gender Equity in Academic Health and Medicine Committee hosted its <u>GEAHM Leadership</u> <u>Conference</u> and revealed the <u>2022 Frontline Heroes and Hidden Heroes</u> recognizing individuals on the frontlines and working behind the scenes who have shown at most dedication to health, welfare and education to the community. ## **Irish American Heritage Month**



Congress designated March as Irish-American Heritage Month in 1991 and every year the President of the U.S. issues a proclamation commemorating the occasion. Originally a religious holiday to honor St. Patrick, who introduced Christianity to Ireland in the 5th century, St. Patrick's Day has evolved into a celebration of all things Irish. ## **Greek American Heritage Month**



Also known as Hellenic Heritage Month coincides with the celebration of Greece's National Greek Independence Day on March 25th. Hellenism, originating from Έλλην (Éllēn, "a Greek"), is the emulation of ancient Greek culture, civilization, principles, and ideals, including humanism, reason, the pursuit of knowledge, the arts, moderation, and civic responsibility.


