- Aligns all elements of "aging well"
- Benefits everyone





A COMPREHENSIVE PLAN FOR AGING: A PLAN AND A PROCESS

- Cross-sector approach
- Aligns state and local policy, programs and funding
- Institutionalized by executive and legislative branches
- Implemented by state and local agencies/organizations






A COMPREHENSIVE PLAN FOR <u>AGING</u>: THE DEMOGRAPHIC SHIFT CHANGES EVERYTHING

- Ability to have vital, healthy communities
- Ability to organize work/services
- Ability to support individuals

THE REALITY OF THE "SHIFT"



1925 SNAPSHOT: NOT MANY OLDER ADULTS

OREGON'S LIFE EXPECTANCY:

- 57.6 for men
- 60.6 for women

LIFE EXPECTANCY IN 2020:

- 79
- 1.1 years greater than national average

1960 OREGON SNAPSHOT:

LOTS OF BABIES

1960:

Fertility rate: 113 per 1000


2022:

Fertility rate: 48 per 1000

FACTS:

- Oregon has the lowest birth rate of any state west of Ohio (7th lowest in US)
- A baby born in 1960 turns 62 this year






A CPA

HELPS EVERYONE TO SEE HOW PROBLEMS ARE INTER-RELATED AND COMPOUND THE ADVERSE IMPACT OF:

- Fragmentation
- Underfunding of basic critical services
- Limited support services
- Difficulty accessing health care

LARGELY THE SAME ISSUES AS 50 YEARS AGO

POTENTIAL RURAL HEALTH CARE:

- Overcomes distance/transportation
- Extends expertise
- Expands monitoring potential

NOT READY:

- Compensation issues
- Regulations/liability
- Technical capacity of users
- Broadband infrastructure



HOW COULD A CPA HELP?

ADDRESS BARRIERS FOR OLDER ADULTS AND OTHERS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS:

- Provide personal navigators
- Create dispersed access sites
- Incorporate supplementary diagnostic aids
- Improve methods to deliver follow-up
- Respond to compensation, regulation and liability issues
- Prioritize rural broadband



TODAY'S WORKFORCE SHORTAGE WAS PREDICTABLE

FUELED BY:

- Reimbursement policies
- Medicalization of care and support
- Regulatory responses
- Credentialing and training strategies



HOW COULD A CPA HELP?

ADDRESS IMPLICATION OF CHANGING AGE STRUCTURE:

- Reimagined and redesigned work across the lifespan
- Counterbalance specialization with support for efforts such as peer support and *promotara* models
- Integrated response of social determinants of health
- Mitigate the unintended consequences of credentialing
