BRINGING VISION CARE INTO THE COMMUNITY

For over a decade, the OHSU Casey Eye
Institute (Casey) Community Outreach
Program has been dedicated to addressing
preventable blindness and vision loss
directly in the community. In collaboration
with a dynamic network of community
partners across Oregon, the program
provides free vision screening services
directly to those who experience barriers to
receiving eye care.

Donor funded, volunteer staffed and mission driven, the program's vision screenings identify common preventable and treatable eye conditions that often cause blindness.

Despite these efforts, there are still unmet needs for vision services in Oregon. Early detection and access to treatment are critical to preventing blindness and vision loss.

Casey is at the forefront of breakthroughs in high-resolution ocular imaging technology and clinical care. Leveraging these advances, Casey is poised to transform the future of community eye care by detecting the underlying causes of vision loss faster than ever before directly in communities most at risk of blinding eye disease.

INTRODUCING THE OREGON VISION HEALTH NETWORK

The Casey Community Outreach Program is introducing a whole new approach to community eye care by building the Oregon Vision Health Network (OVHN). The network is a statewide group of over 50 partner organization working together to overcome the barriers to providing eye care for rural and underserved communities who are at the highest risk for blindness.

By building upon trusted community partnerships, the OVHN combines mobile healthcare, the latest imaging equipment, information technology, donor and community resources, and the expertise at Casey Eye Institute to expand our capacity to save sight in Oregon and beyond by finding and treating disease early.



MOBILE CLINIC OUTREACH

The Casey Community Outreach Program continues to maintain a critical presence throughout Oregon through its mobile eye clinic. In 2022, the mobile clinic provided vision care to communities disproportionally impacted by barriers in accessing health care services. Along with an update to the exterior of the mobile eye clinic, this last year also marked a return of the program's week-long service trips to visit our partners in Western, Eastern and Southern Oregon. In 2022, the total in-kind economic impact to communities across Oregon was equal to \$432,036. And with a second mobile eye clinic scheduled to be deployed in 2023, it will provide the program with additional ability to reach more communities across the state.

IMPACT IN 2022



Eye exams provided to adults at highest risk for eye diseases and who experience barriers to vision care, in partnership with over 30 community agencies, at 35 sites across Oregon.

525 (68%)

Individuals **received a prescription and glasses at no cost,** a gift of sight valued at **\$144,450**.

322 (42%)

Individuals received a referral for a condition that threatens their sight, including diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, and macular degeneration.

1,596

Volunteer hours given, an equivalent of **\$45,053**, based on the value of volunteer time in Oregon.








VISION HEALTH NAVIGATOR TRAINING

Since fully implementing the training in 2021, more than 60 community health workers from 28 agencies across the state have been trained as Vision Health Navigators (VHN). This training was developed by the Casey Community Outreach Program and approved by the Oregon Health Authority Office of Equity and Inclusion. Designed to empower community health workers and other local health advocates, the training teaches VHNs how to perform several types of basic vision screenings, complete risk assessment tools for common eye diseases, and how to identify local resource to share with their patients.

The training also helps the VHNs better understand the prevalence and causes of preventable blindness, and how to identify social and environmental factors that increase the risk of blindness. The VHNs are a key partner for the Oregon Vision Health Network by working to preserve vision right in their own communities.




EXPANDING ACCESS THROUGH TELEHEALTH

For the last year, the Casey Community
Outreach Program has been building a
network of community telehealth screening
sites, which allows local health
organizations to expand basic eye health
services. Each of these community sites will
have advanced imaging equipment where
patients can be screened and visit an eye
specialist virtually. The telemedicine
program will dramatically increase the
number of access points to improve early
detection and monitoring of eye diseases
throughout Oregon.

Building the telemedicine program as part of the Oregon Vision Health Network has created a telehealth infrastructure that is robust and flexible, allowing local health organizations to effectively monitor and support vision health outcomes right in their own communities.

At the heart of the telemedicine program is the vision to bring the expertise and advanced technology of a world-class eye institute out of Portland's urban center to Oregonians who experience barriers to accessing high-quality vision care, wherever they live. It will also connect people at risk of losing sight with care closer to home.





OVHN IMPACT STORIES

About two decades ago, **Gisela**, **from Hood River**, learned she needed glasses after starting kindergarten. Her parents, local farmworkers, didn't know where to turn.

Gisela learned from an early age how important it is to have access to quality vision care that is culturally and linguistically appropriate. She was referred to a local doctor's office, and despite her young age, she had to act as an interpreter during her own vision exam.

After earning a bachelor's degree in community/public health education at Western Oregon University, Gisela become one of the state's very first Vision Health Navigators trained by the Casey Community Outreach Program. She is determined to ensure others have better and more culturally appropriate access to eye care so other families don't have to go through what she did.

Trevor, from Chiloquin, noticed his vision was getting blurry. He experienced access barriers to seeing a local eye doctor regularly, and found it difficult to prioritize his own healthcare needs.

Trevor and his mother were able to get a free comprehensive eye exam at one of the Casey Community Outreach Program's mobile clinics when it came to his area. He learned that he has glaucoma. Trevor was able to receive eye care that prevented him from going blind.

FROM ACROSS THE STREET TO ACROSS THE OCEAN

To improve vision and eye health in Oregon, international partnerships must play a role. When global health experts and local communities exchange knowledge and skills, we learn from each other to better preserve and restore sight for all individuals. Over the last year, Casey faculty and the International Ophthalmology Program have worked to expand access to eye care and conducted research that improves our knowledge of the leading causes of blindness.

SOUTHEAST ASIA

- Worked with partners in Thailand to translate a deep learning model for glaucoma diagnosis to learn how the model could change to adapt to differing populations.
- Developed partnerships in Thailand to **apply artificial intelligence to expand access to diagnoses and treatment for corneal infections**, a major cause of blindness in the tropics.
- Conducted a needs and clinical site assessment for developing robust pediatric eye care services at hospitals and in the surrounding community.
- Trained two doctors at Casey Eye Institute so they are able to provide better basic and specialized eye care in their communities when they return to Thailand and Myanmar.

OTHER PROJECTS

- Dr. Nathaniel Gebhard pursued a year-long Global Ophthalmology Fellowship, which took him to Nepal, India, Tanzania, and American Samoa. He collaborated with local ophthalmologists in skills exchange, cataract surgery outreach, and more.
- **Dr. John Clements worked in Angola, Africa,** during a month-long visit providing training for cataract surgeons. He realized a long-standing goal of creating a functional wet lab for surgical simulation with the National Eye Institute of Angola.

Global Health has always been about addressing the needs of the underserved—whether that is across the ocean or across the street. Once people internalize that calling, they continue to be more aware of unaddressed needs for the remainder of their careers, wherever they live and wherever they serve.
