

#### Possible issues impacting OUR practice/coping during patient end-of-life care

- \_\_\_\_ It is more complex than positive or negative, it can be complicated
- Profound feelings of sadness, shock, frustration, anger, guilt, apathy can all occur within the same day or sometimes within the very same moment
- The details/circumstances of the patient's death can play a major role in our response
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- Families and support system presence or lack thereof

#### Possible issues impacting OUR practice/coping during patient end-of-life care continued

- Our "stuff" including personality, culture and experience form our response to subconsciously
- Loss touches loss, being in the presence of death can conjure our own grief experiences related to our own loss
- You are human...we are all humans, and just approach life differently. We rarely discuss dying as a part of living

### The pivotal role of nursing during patient end-of-life care

- Nurses have the most exposure to patient and family's potential psychosocial needs
- Nurses extended exposure to patient and family greatly assists with identify their coping, possible interpersonal conflicts, potential barriers to care and risk of acute grief response
- Initiating and providing ongoing support and education regarding the dying process

Address complicated dynamics that may compromise care environment (family discord)

Continue counseling by providing emotional support and address need for further resources and possible referral to resources related to grief/loss

Familiarize family with postmortem protocol
