

FINDINGS EOL PREFERENCES

Consider your own...

Not out of the ordinary!

FINDINGS

Concept of EOL care is unfamiliar or misconceived (negative connotation)

- Abandoning family
- Suicide
- Giving up
- Isolated from family
- Exclusive to wealthy people

"Hospicio" often carried connotation of institutionalizing a loved one

FINDINGS a closer look at barriers

PROVIDERS NOT OFFERING

Cancer patient
offered Death
with Dignity
but not EOL
care

Cancer patient was told by RN she has terminal illness without physician present

"White people don't share these things with people of color."

"I didn't know what else to do and I am worried my family could suffer."

Reports of returning to Mexico

- Cheaper health care
- Lack of insurance
- Alternative therapies
- Felt there is no other choice
- Fears of jeopardizing family's immigration status


