BECOMING A PRECEPTOR



"Students and new nurses have lots of questions. My job is to encourage them to ask those questions and help them feel at-ease in clinical situations. I support and empower them. I love teaching."

Christina's mother inspired her to be a nurse. Her mom brought home medical booklets that she used as a certified nursing assistant while working with elderly patients who lived in rural parts of the Navajo Nation. Christina loved reading those booklets and felt drawn to helping and educating people. She also watched her dad who was a diabetic become frustrated with his health care. She wanted to make a difference.

COMPASSION LEADS TO HEALING

As a nurse, Christina would often show new nurses the ropes and help them understand how to be successful. She's found that working alongside new nurses gives them confidence when they have to do a procedure on a patient or when dealing with difficult patients. She reminds them that the patients are stressed, they are away from home and scared of being in a hospital. She notes that engaging patients often helps them open up about their concerns and makes them calmer. She takes a hands-on approach.

NEVER STOP LEARNING

Christina's employer was very supportive of her journey to become a preceptor, as were the nurses she worked with. She also attended the OHSU preceptor program remotely and felt it was valuable.

Today, Christina is a full-time clinical instructor at the University of Alaska in Anchorage. She continues to work at Alaska Regional Hospital in the endoscopy department as needed and enjoys working with patients and new nurses there.

Advice from Christina

- Provide a positive learning environment
- Listen to student's/new nurse's questions
- Be organized
- Be available and approachable
- Offer encouragement
- Be resourceful
- Show compassion
- Patience helps learning

Roles of a preceptor

- Assessing student's/new nurse's orientation needs
- Planning learning experiences
- Facilitating patient care to achieve identified learning needs and goals
- Modeling and coaching
- Offering positive reinforcement
- Using humor to make learning enjoyable
