### **Executive Summary**

- 1. SNLH conducted this CHNA in partnership with other local organizations to identify significant health needs in north Lincoln County, Oregon.
- 2. Data was collected through surveys, focus groups, interviews, and secondary sources.
- 3. Key health priorities identified include:
- Access to healthcare (medical, dental, mental/behavioral)
- Suicide prevention
- Substance use disorder
- Anxiety and depression
- Food insecurity
- Child care, abuse and neglect
- Domestic violence
- Housing costs and homelessness
- Poverty
- Culturally and linguistically appropriate services
- 4. The assessment found disparities in health outcomes based on factors like race/ethnicity, income, and geographic location within the county.
- 5. SNLH serves a rural, coastal area with a population of about 50,862. The county is designated as a health provider shortage area.
- 6. COVID-19 has had significant impacts on healthcare access and community health in the region.
- 7. SNLH will use this assessment to guide its community benefit activities and partnerships to address the identified health needs over the next three years.

### **Biggest Gaps in Service**

- 1. Mental and behavioral health services, especially for children, youth, and adults. This includes services for substance use disorder, depression, anxiety, and suicidality.
- 2. Access to medical, dental, and mental/behavioral health care in general.
- 3. Culturally and linguistically appropriate care, particularly for marginalized and stigmatized populations.
- 4. Workforce shortages and capacity issues, especially in recruiting and retaining culturally competent providers and staff in this isolated coastal area.
- 5. Services for unhoused community members, including wraparound support services.
- 6. Affordable and quality child care, which impacts both child health and family access to healthcare.
- 7. Substance use disorder treatment, with the report noting that a new 16-bed alcohol and drug residential treatment facility is planned to open in 2023.

- 8. Navigation and patient advocacy services, especially for lower-income people, those with mental health issues, migrant workers, and people with specific linguistic or cultural needs.
- 9. Transportation services, particularly for rural communities, people of color, people in poverty, people with disabilities, and those with language barriers.
- 10. Preventive care services, as 15% of survey respondents had not seen a doctor in the last year for a routine checkup.

#### **Greatest Barriers to Care**

- 1. Lack of workforce and capacity: The area struggles with recruiting and retaining culturally competent providers and staff, leading to increased wait times for appointments.
- 2. Lack of insurance and/or insurance literacy: Approximately 12% of people in Lincoln County are uninsured.
- 3. Complexity of the healthcare system: The report notes a lack of navigation and patient advocates to help people, especially lower-income individuals, those with mental health issues, migrant workers, and people with specific linguistic or cultural needs.
- 4. Lack of culturally appropriate facilities, policies, and workforce: This leads to mistrust and reluctance to seek care among marginalized populations.
- 5. Transportation: Particularly for rural communities, people of color, those in poverty, people with disabilities, and individuals with language barriers.
- 6. Lack of workforce diversity: There's a shortage of providers who reflect the diversity of the community (e.g., trans or trans-friendly providers, mental health providers of color).
- 7. Cost: The report mentions that dental care, prescription medications, eyeglasses, and mental health care or counseling were services that respondents needed but couldn't access due to cost.
- 8. Cultural and linguistic barriers: The need for culturally and linguistically appropriate care is emphasized throughout the report.
- 9. Geographic isolation: Being a rural coastal area, access to specialized care can be limited.
- 10. Mistrust and trauma: Especially among marginalized populations, leading to reluctance in seeking care.
- 11. COVID-19 impacts: The pandemic has led to longer wait times, postponed care, and related access issues.

# The Unique Needs of the Community

1. Mental and behavioral health services: Particularly for children, youth, and adults, including substance use disorder treatment.

- 2. Affordable housing and support for unhoused populations: The community has a high rate of severe housing problems and homelessness.
- 3. Access to medical, dental, and mental health care: The area is designated as a health provider shortage area.
- 4. Culturally and linguistically appropriate care: Especially for marginalized and stigmatized populations.
- 5. Suicide prevention: Lincoln County has high suicide rates, particularly among certain age groups.
- 6. Food security: The county has a food insecurity rate of 14%.
- 7. Child care: There are only two child care centers per 1,000 children under 5 in the county.
- 8. Services addressing child abuse and neglect: The county has higher rates of child abuse reports than the state average.
- 9. Domestic violence services: Including safe housing for survivors.
- 10. Poverty alleviation: The county has high poverty rates, especially for children, youth, and people with disabilities.
- 11. Services for an aging population: The county has a higher percentage of residents over 65 compared to state averages.
- 12. Substance use disorder treatment: A new 16-bed facility is planned to open in 2023.
- 13. Transportation services: Especially for rural residents, low-income individuals, and those with disabilities.
- 14. Economic development and job opportunities: To address multigenerational poverty.
- 15. Services for veterans: The county has a high percentage of unhoused veterans experiencing chronic homelessness.
- 16. Cultural competency in healthcare: To build trust with marginalized communities and improve health outcomes.
- 17. Support for those affected by wildfires and other climate-related events.

## What the Hospital or CCO is Doing Well

- 1. Collaborative efforts: SNLH works closely with various community partners, agencies, and organizations to address health needs.
- 2. Comprehensive services: SNLH provides a wide range of services including emergency care, birthing services, urgent surgeries, and specialized surgical services.

- 3. Outpatient care: The hospital operates 23 outpatient clinics offering specialty care, family medicine, obstetrics/gynecology, pediatrics, and urgent/walk-in care.
- 4. COVID-19 response: SNLH was a first responder for many medical, mental/behavioral, dental, and social needs during the pandemic, treating thousands of COVID patients while maintaining essential services.
- 5. Community support: SNLH provided \$150,000 to six local agencies through social accountability funding, plus an additional \$109,000 in funding, food, clothing, and other resources during COVID-19 and the 2021 wildfires.
- 6. Accessibility efforts: The hospital offered transportation, telehealth, and home visits to over 1,500 people in south Lincoln County.
- 7. Health education: SNLH offered in-person and virtual education through health fairs, workshops, and classes on various topics including Adverse Childhood Experiences, Understanding Stigma for Substance Use Disorder, Implicit Bias, and Addressing Homelessness.
- 8. Diverse community engagement: For the CHNA, SNLH ensured input from diverse racial/ethnic groups, LGBTQIA2S+ community members, veterans, non-English speaking people, and other marginalized populations.
- 9. Regional collaboration: SNLH participates in regional health improvement efforts through partnerships like the Coast to Cascades Community Wellness Network.
- 10. New facility: In February 2020, SNLH opened a new, state-of-the-art hospital facility, improving its capacity to serve the community.

### **Strengths of the Community**

- 1. Strong partnerships and collaborations between organizations to address community health issues. The report mentions SNLH has "strong partnerships with organizations and agencies in north Lincoln County and across the region."
- 2. A commitment to improving health and well-being of children and youth, with a focus on family stability, kindergarten readiness, and equitable services.
- 3. Several organizations providing nutrition, healthy lifestyle programs, and social supports for youth, like Neighbors for Kids.
- 4. Active coalitions working to address health priorities, like the Lincoln County Community Club.
- 5. Community action agencies serving vulnerable populations, like Community Services Consortium.
- 6. Transportation assistance programs for medical appointments and other needs, through organizations like Oregon Cascades West Council of Governments and Volunteer Caregivers.

- 7. Plans to open a 16-bed alcohol and drug residential treatment facility in 2023.
- 8. Community leadership working on a comprehensive plan to assist unhoused populations, including emergency shelters, transitional housing and affordable housing initiatives.
- 9. Support for programs like Project Turnkey to provide supportive and transitional housing.
- 10. A variety of community-based organizations offering health promotion services, including food banks, shelters, community gardens, farmers markets, etc.
- 11. Educational resources like Oregon Coast Community College providing training in healthcare and community health fields.
