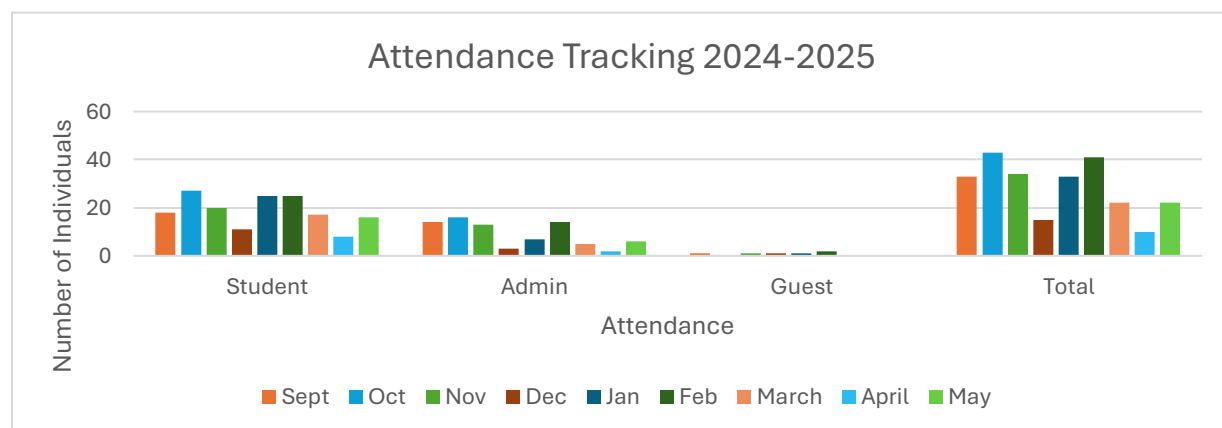


Figure 1 Attendance of across student reps, admin, and guests.

AHSC Events and Highlights

1. **Welcome Back BBQ and Information Fair** (October 2024)
 - Sponsored by the Office of Student Life, All-Hill Student Council, and Graduate Student Organization. Over 65 student interest groups were tabled and over 1,000 attendees participated in the Welcome Back BBQ. The AHSC Executive Board increased traffic to the table with prizes and interactive games that encouraged students to visit other tables and learn about all OHSU has to offer. The prize on the line were tickets to a Timbers Match!

2. **Timber's Night** (October 2024)
 - OHSU students 40 tickets were dispersed at the Welcome Back BBQ as prizes for participation in the AHSC E-Board game. 22 students attended the event where we had pub patio seating directly behind the goalie.

3. **Pumpkin Patch Fall Fest** (October 2024)
 - 125 OHSU students and guests celebrated the fall at the Pumpkin Patch in Sauvie's Island. Bonfire areas were reserved for student socializing and activities, which included pumpkin painting, scavenger hunt, and smores making. Tickets included entrance to the corn maize and tickets to purchase pumpkins and or other items at the gift shop.

4. **Winter Retreat** (January 2025)
 - A weekend getaway at Sunriver Resort during MLK Weekend for students and a guest explore nature and outdoor winter activities, and even the night life of beautiful Bend, Oregon. Sunriver Resort hosted rooms of 4, 6 and 10 capacity with access to pools, hot tubs and restaurants. This year in addition to discounted lift tickets and transportation to Sun River, AHSC was able to offer gym access and spa access. Students could enjoy

amenities such as pickleball and massages! Many students opted to bring their four-legged companions as well.

- 5. **FLAME Awards** (March 2025)
 - The 20th Annual FLAME Awards ceremony celebrates student and faculty achievements, fostering a culture of appreciation and recognition. The event is fully organized by students from the planning committee, marketing, nomination review committee, and volunteers.
 - The nomination review committee was composed of 13 student representatives from across all programs. There were 220 total submissions with 184 unique across 8 award categories. There were 16 winners and runner-ups who received plaques and fruit baskets or flower arrangements, and 8 honorable mentions who received a certificate.
 - To increase engagement and encourage people to attend and stay, the awards were hosted “Oscar’s style,” with those honored kept confidential until a brief introduction was read, their name was announced, and they were asked to come to the stage. There were also intermission games where attendees could win prizes from Made in Oregon or gift cards from the OHSU Campus Store.

- 6. **Spring Social** (May 2025)
 - Hosted at Punch Bowl Social in downtown Portland in the Pioneer Place mall, this event offered OHSU students and guests the opportunity to enjoy interactive games from bowling to billiards, karaoke, and shareable foods. There were approximately 170 attendees. The attrition was low with only 20 people not in attendance.

Approved Funding Requests and Rebates

Each school received rebates to fund interdisciplinary activities and initiatives. The total sum was determined based on the number of full-time, Portland-based students. AHSC budgeted \$5000 for funding requests for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. These funds are designated for events that are advertised and open to all OHSU students.

2024-2025: 13 reimbursed events **\$4,720**/\$5,000

1. **Neurology Student Interest Group & Poison Waters** (10.04.2024) – Requested \$200 | **Approved \$200** | 17 votes

- community-building event featuring the renowned drag queen Poison Waters. She will share her powerful and inspiring story of growing up in a dysfunctional and financially challenged household, coming out during the height of the AIDS pandemic in the late 80s, and her journey to becoming the beloved performer Poison Waters. The event aims to foster inclusivity and understanding among students, offering an opportunity to bond through meaningful conversations. Following her talk, attendees will participate in interactive games to further build community.
 - Impact statement: “She [Poison Waters] didn't think she could do drag until she saw Black drag queens performing, and this resonated with a student when this student saw a physician representing her own background. So, a very meaningful, and fun event. [...] She is a wonderful guest to host.”
2. **Health Equity Fair** (10.06.2024) – Requested \$1000 | **Approved \$500** | 19 votes
 - HCEF is an annual student-run fair providing free health care, social services, and supplies for Portland’s marginalized and underserved. The fair provides services such as free vision screening from Casey Eye Institute, diabetic care, dental screening, HIV health information, skin screening, signing people up for Medicare/Medicaid, shower stalls, foot baths, veterinary services, vaccines, and more.
 3. **IHI Open School Chapter** (10.08.2024) – Requested \$250 | **Approved \$175** | 18 votes
 - IHI Open School is hosting an introductory lunch talk where we will introduce who IHI is and what we do. Attendees will learn “What is healthcare improvement and why should I care?” IHI will provide practical skills, meaningful interdisciplinary collaboration, and reinvigoration about your role in healthcare. IHI is an international organization for healthcare improvement work and interdisciplinary collaboration, and more. Our chapter spans all PSU and OHSU schools. Everyone is welcome – students, house staff, trainees, faculty, etc.
 4. **Tennis for Beginners** (10.12.2024) – Requested \$132.53 | **Approved \$132.53** | 19 votes
 5. **OHSU Friends of MSF**
 - (10.19.2024) – Requested \$435 | **Approved \$356.28** | 29 votes
 - Humanitarian First Aid Training
 - (02.27.2025) – Requested \$135 | **Approved \$128** | 25 votes
 - The purpose of this event is to assemble first aid kits for homeless individuals who use drugs, in collaboration with Portland People’s Outreach Program (PPOP). This initiative provided an opportunity to engage in humanitarian efforts locally, supporting PPOP's harm reduction mission and positively impacting the community.
 6. **Bridges Collaborative Care Clinic – Charity 5k** (10.27.2024) – Requested \$1000 | **Approved \$500** | 16 votes
 - Student-led healthcare clinic whose mission is to engage vulnerable and underserved populations by providing free, low barrier, participant-centered care and services in the Portland metro area. Charity 5k to raise money for the Bridges Collaborative Clinic.
 7. **OHSU Science Policy PDX 2024** (11.19.2024) – Requested \$55 | **Approved \$55** | 23 votes
 - New Member Meeting and introduction to science policy.
 8. **OHSU APAMSA: Lunar New Year Festival** (01.29.2025) – Requested \$50 | **Approved \$50** | 26 votes
 9. **Rooted: Earthy Trivia** (01.22.2025) – Requested \$75 | **Approved \$75** | 19 votes
 10. **2025 OHSU Annual Ramadan Iftar** (03.14.2025) – Requested \$1000 | **Approved \$760.42** | 24 votes
 11. **Accessible OHSU Drop-In Community Building Event** (04.01.2025) – Requested \$350 | **Approved \$350** | 16 votes
 - A drop-in event that fosters community building and support for all members of OHSU from all schools and departments with disabilities and disability allies. This event is open to students from all schools and departments of OHSU

12. **Research Forum Student Lunch with Nobel Laureate, David Baltimore, Ph.D. (05.06.2025)** – Requested \$952.50 | **Approved \$845.90** | 20 votes
 13. **2025 Paint and Sip Night with Wellness Rx.** – Requested \$750.00 | **Approved \$592.11** | 19 votes
 - relaxing Paint & Sip event where you'll be guided step-by-step by the one and only Mr. Monetti
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Committees and Initiatives

1. **Bylaws Review:** Comprehensive updates were made to ensure clarity and relevance, emphasizing commitment and accountability among members.
 2. **Social Media Engagement:**
 - Launched AHSC Instagram channel to enhance communication and outreach.
 3. **Surveys and Feedback Mechanisms:**
 - Implemented **post-event surveys** to gather insights and improve future programming. The Student & Student Group Survey helped support 11 student and student interest groups (SIG).
 - A **student engagement survey** was developed to identify community needs. AHSC received 6 submissions with student ideas and preferences with overwhelming support for the Berry Picking event. Students are interested in more events like talent shows and trivia nights, community building centered around coffee, boba, or study breaks, and more exciting intramural prizes and swags.
 - An **event follow-up form** was implemented to improve the post-event feedback collection and streamline reimbursement processes. Unfortunately, no one used this survey and preferred to communicate directly via AHSC email.
 4. **Finance Committee:** The internal finance committee under the guidance of President Tyne Riddick and VP Finance Michael Henderson was assembled and tasked with whether to raise, lower, or maintain the current student fee of **\$17.00**.
 - **28** active representatives voted for the student fee to remain the same, which was forwarded to the Provost Office for final review.

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Challenges and Opportunities

AHSC faced challenges in attendance consistency and event promotion. One contributing factor was the lack of clear communication about meeting times and locations, leading to scheduling conflicts. Additionally, some students expressed difficulty balancing council activities with their academic responsibilities. To address these issues, AHSC plans to introduce more flexible scheduling options, encourage reps to utilize Microsoft Teams as the centralized communication platform for reminders, and collaborate with program leaders to encourage participation. Targeted promotion through social media and event incentives will also be key strategies moving forward.

However, the council made strides in creating an inclusive atmosphere and fostering interdisciplinary collaboration. Initiatives such as the new Instagram and the successful planning and execution of large

events such as Winter Retreat, Pumpkin Patch Fall Fest, and the 20th annual FLAME Awards demonstrated the council's ability to adapt and innovate.

Future Goals (2025-2026)

- Expand interdisciplinary events to include new themes and activities.
 - Partner with SIGs for co-hosted events
 - Strengthen campus-wide communication strategies through regular newsletters and social media updates.
 - Increase incentives and creative themes to boost general meeting attendance for student representatives.
 - Increase engagement with underrepresented student groups.
 - Collaborate with OHSU's administration on policy development and student wellness initiatives.
 - Launch mentorship programs to support academic and professional growth.
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Conclusion

The 2024-2025 academic year was a testament to AHSC's resilience, innovation, and commitment to the OHSU community. Through events, advocacy, and collaboration, the council strengthened its role as a pillar of student life. AHSC looks forward to building this momentum to further enhance student experience in the upcoming year.
