





After residency and spending one year on faculty at OHSU, I went to UCSF for a Mohs surgery fellowship. Then, I joined some other wonderful OHSU-grads at Bend Dermatology in Bend, OR. We've been in Bend for almost 5 years, and life continues to get sweeter. We now have two children, Forrest (almost 3) and Solveig (6 months). OHSU truly set me on a life-changing trajectory, in which I'm forever grateful.

I loved having attendings that were not only extraordinarily knowledgeable in their fields, but also exceptionally kind, approachable, (and often very funny). To this day, I still feel comfortable reaching out to them about challenging cases. I'll never



forget the thrill of hearing attendings arguing over morphology, Nicole Fett reciting an article from years prior, or Anna Bar telling me to go "stitch it up" or "do the skin graft," despite staring back at her with the eyes of a baby first year. The fond memories are abundant and priceless.

"Things I Learned"

The residents were asked to submit a pearl from a recent conference, didactics session, morphology, or clinic. Here's what they report!

- Adeeb Haroon: Topical ruxolitinib can be used to treat NLD.
 A small case series/trial showed 58% improvement of NL score using ruxolitinib 1.5% cream BID
- •Shannon Throckmorton: From one of Dr. Aguh's talk during AAD: metformin has been shown to be an antifibrotic in preclinical studies and that it can be utilized in CCCA.
- Jennifer Strunck: Evoked scale sign: when you quickly stretch tinea versicolor it elicits a white patch of scale overlying the affected area
- Milie Fang: Periorificial dermatitis can appear in the vulvar area and be mistaken for genital warts in children.
- Jake Nelson: Phototherapy can lower folic acid levels, so women of childbearing age undergoing phototherapy should be recommended to take folic acid to reduce risk of neural tube defects in unplanned pregnancy.

"Clinical Pearl"

In this section we want to highlight one pearl from a faculty member! Thank you, Dr. Nicole Fett for these words of wisdom:

Clinical Pearl: Pyoderma gangrenosum and systemic sclerosis can co-occur. In this situation you need to be cautious with systemic steroid use (doses greater than 20 mg daily is associated with the development of renal crisis in patients with SSc) and should consider reaching for treatments known to help both conditions (mycophenolate mofetil and IVIG).

ollaboration with their pulmonologist is important. The edema from the PAH can be a driver of pathergy and poor wound healing. Daily weights with a lasix sliding scale is helpful in managing edema. My patient is not healing with IVIG and mycophenolate and edema control alone, so we have recently added in rituximab, which has fairly good data on treatment of SSc skin disease (and ILD), and fair data on use for PG and PAH in association with SSc.
