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Introduction & Context

- **The National AHEC network (300+ centers) serves over 85% of U.S. counties,** bringing workforce support to rural and underserved areas.
- Created by Congress in 1971 to strengthen the health care workforce in **rural and underserved areas.**
- Oregon AHEC was established in 1990 through the state's first rural health bill.
- **Federally funded** by the Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA), **with a 1:1 state match,** administered through OHSU.
- **HRSA Mission:** To improve health outcomes through access to quality services, a skilled health workforce, and innovative, high-value programs.
- **Five regional centers** deliver statewide services using a hub-and-spoke model.

Oregon Pacific AHEC

Hosted by Samaritan Lebanon Community Hospital. The Center serves communities along the Oregon Coast and I-5 Corridor including the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde, Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians and the counties of Benton, Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Polk, Tillamook and Yamhill.



AHEC of Southwest Oregon

Hosted by Aviva Health in Roseburg. The Center provides services to Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane, Jackson and Josephine counties.



Oregon AHEC Program Office

Hosted by OHSU in Portland.



Oregon Healthcare Workforce Institute

Hosted by Pacific University. The Center serves Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington counties.



Northeast Oregon AHEC

Located on the campus of Eastern Oregon University in La Grande. The Center serves Baker, Gilliam, Hood River, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wasco and Wheeler counties.



Cascades East AHEC

Hosted by St. Charles Health System in Bend. The Center serves Central and Southeastern Oregon and includes the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs, Crook, Deschutes, Grant, Harney, Jefferson, Klamath and Lake counties.

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COMMUNITY-BASED MODEL

- Regional centers are embedded in local communities across Oregon
- Programs are tailored to meet specific regional health workforce needs
- Local partnerships with schools, clinics and hospitals drive programming
- Strengthens rural pathways by building on existing community resources



COMMUNITY-BASED MODEL

- Our regional centers and program office work with foundations and community partners who give support through grants, donations and time.
- OHA funding allowed Oregon AHEC to grow summer camp offerings statewide and offer full scholarships for every camper, eliminating financial barriers.



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WHY PATHWAY PROGRAMS MATTER

- Inspire students early to health careers, especially those from rural and underserved communities
- Build local pathways, making it more likely students will stay and serve their communities
- Provide hands-on experiences, mentorship and support



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CTE & AHEC: WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

- AHEC offers flexible, community-driven programs; CTE is tied to district structures
- Many rural schools lack CTE health programs
- AHEC brings opportunities to students, not just schools
- AHEC supports students beyond high school



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IMPACT & SUCCESS STORIES

- 85% of MedQuest survey respondents have ended up in a health professions careers.
- NEOAHEC spearheaded a pilot of a new Salesforce system to streamline student registration and strengthen data collection on demographics, participation and outcomes.

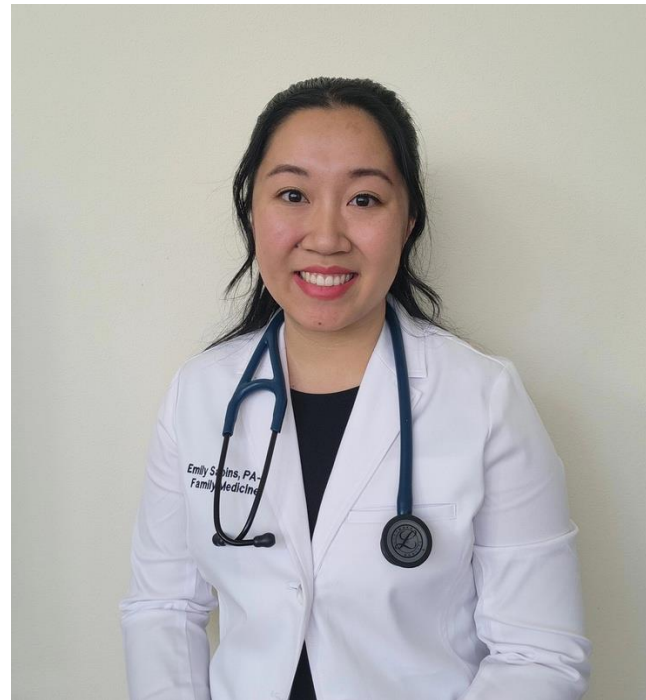


IMPACT & SUCCESS STORIES

- Summer camps expanded this year, and all students offered scholarships thanks to an OHA grant.
 - 265 summer campers in 2025, a 26% increase from 2024.
 - 97% of summer camp participants report increased interest in health careers.
 - Camps were recognized in the Oregon Health Care Workforce Needs Assessment as an exemplary pathway program that must be expanded.
