Laurel Case Lecture Jan. 8

The Annual Laurel Case Visiting Professor Lecture will be held at noon Wednesday, Jan. 8, 2014, in the Old Library Auditorium. Guest lecturer Dr. Robert "Bob" Phillips, Jr., will speak on "As the Community Goes, We Go: Aligning Health Professions Education with Mission and Being Accountable."

Phillips is the vice president for Research and Policy at the American Board of Family Medicine and a professor at Georgetown University and Virginia Commonwealth University. He was selected by the Secretary of Health and Human Services to serve on a Federal Negotiated Rule Making Committee for the redesignation of shortage and underservice areas. Phillips also served as vice-chair of the US Council on Graduate Medical Education and continues to

OCHIN earns PCORI Award

A nearly \$7 million award is being presented to OCHIN Inc. for a project aimed at developing and expanding a health-data network that will be part of a national research network. **Jennifer DeVoe, MD, DPhil**, OCHIN's research director and an associate professor in OHSU Family Medicine, will serve as the principal investigator.



The award was one of 11 presented to clinical research data networks by the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI). OCHIN's project, "Accelerating Data Value Across a National Community Health Center Network (ADVANCE)," was awarded \$6,994,142 over 18 months. [Read more](#)

Research to improve the nurse-family partnership in community practice

Unintended and short interval pregnancies are associated with adverse health effects for women, children and families. Increasing access to effective contraceptives could prevent unintended pregnancy and reduce short-interval unintended pregnancy.
